IT'S OLD RIVAL TAKES DEAD LEADER'S OFFICE.

Prince-Yamagata Appointed President of the Council—They Worked Together for Their Country.

TOKYO, Wednesday, Nov. 17.—The appointment today of Prince Arima Yamagata as president of the privy council in succession to the late Prince Ito returns to that office the one whom the privy council succeeded on June 15, 1898. In the earlier days there was intense rivalry between the two men for power but in all matters affecting the nation and the nation's wealth they joined hands. With great regularity the pendulum swung first in the one direction and then in the other, but has an income of nearly \$1000. He through it all there was no personal bitterness or estrangement, but rather a mutual support and acknowledgment each of the other's greatness.

No, Ito, no Yamagata, no Yamagata, no Ito, has been a common saying among the wise politicians of Japan. The death of Prince Ito, therefore, took away from Yamagata his strongest prop while it removed his strongest opponent.

The city of Chatham, Ont. has adopted a by law imposing a license for \$50 a year on Chinese laundries. The by law also imposes regulations such as:

There shall be no communication between the laundry plant and the sleeping apartment.

The laundrymen must not use their mouths to spray the clothes.

The Chathamian alleges that the by-law is prohibitive. They claim among other things that if they are not allowed to spray the clothes with their mouths they will be compelled to install expensive machinery.
