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SPECIAL MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Protest Against Councillor Sansom was Shelled till Next Meeting

SHORT SESSION

The Town Council met on Tuesday evening in special session to deal with the protest of Dr. Martin against councillor Sansom.

His Worship Mayor Murray presided. There were present councillors Alexander, Lunam, Miller, Ellsworth and Pinault at the opening.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and confirmed, at which time councillors White and Sansom entered the meeting.

Communication was read from Wm. Taylor resigning his position as street commissioner. Letter laid on the table for further discussion.

Communication from John P. LeBlanc regarding street lighting on Hillside extension. Referred to Electric Light Committee.

A number of petitions were received for licenses which were referred to Police and License Committee.

His Worship then said that this special meeting had been called to deal with the protest of Dr. Martin against the election of councillor Sansom. Dr. Martin was not present, A. T. LeBlanc appeared for him.

Mr. LeBlanc asked that the council postpone the matter until the next meeting as he was not quite ready to proceed, which permission was granted.

The letter of Wm. Taylor was then taken up. Councillor Pinault stated that he had some talk with the street commissioner and there seemed to be some friction between the keeper of the horses and the commissioner. Taylor was willing to reconsider his decision if he were granted the full charge of the horses and a raise of pay. The discussion which ensued was taken part in by councillors White, Lunam and Miller which brought out the fact that the council had, on the last occasion there was friction, passed a motion giving Noble full charge of the horses, and if Taylor did not take his orders from Noble he was to tender his resignation. No one would move in the matter and latterly it was resolved to let the letter lie on the table, and in the meantime the chairman of the Public Property and Streets, and Fire Protection Committee were to arrange a conference and see what could be done.

It was stated that B. N. Underhill who had been appointed assessor at last meeting could not qualify, and Jas. P. Wall Sr. was appointed in his place.

Councillor Sansom was appointed chairman of Public Charities Committee, and replaces Mr. S. Laughlan on all other committees.

Ex Mayor McDonald gave an interesting and instructive report of his visit to Chatham where he inspected the county almshouse there, and Town Solicitor MacKenzie reported on the legislation which was lately before the house at Fredericton.

Council then adjourned.

COMMISSION FISHERY OFFICER

The Committee of the Privy Council on the recommendation of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, advise that, in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of the Fisheries Act, Chapter 46 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, Mr. M. Mowat, of Campbellton, New Brunswick, be appointed Fishery Officer, with-out Salary. The Minister states that Mr. Mowat does not desire any emolument for the services he may render, but assents to the necessary authority to properly deal with illegal fishing, anywhere in the Dominion.

CAMPBELLTON WILL CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY OF DEVASTATION

Enthusiastic Meeting of Board of Trade Decides to Hold One Big Day of Celebration on Thursday, July Eleventh.

"BACK TO NEW BRUNSWICK"

An enthusiastic meeting of the Board of Trade was held in the council chambers Wednesday. A large number of representative business men being present.

The meeting was called to discuss the advisability of holding a celebration during what is now known as "Back to New Brunswick" week, July 9th to 14th.

After some general business had been transacted, A. E. G. McKenzie moved that Campbellton hold one or two days of celebration during the "Back to New Brunswick or Old Home week".

This was carried unanimously. A central or managing committee of five, with power to add to its number was appointed. This committee will confer with the School Board, Town Council, Firemen, Baseball club and any other society and make arrangements for the program. Messrs F. E. Blackhall, A. E. G. McKenzie, Dr. Pinault, W. Marquis and C. A. Alexander were appointed such committee.

The matter of the dates for the celebration created considerable discussion and as this is an extremely busy season it was felt that one day should be enough, and that all places of business and manufacturers close on that day. It was decided to hold the celebration on July 11th, the anniversary of the Campbellton fire.

The committee immediately commenced work and plans are being laid to make this the biggest day in Campbellton's history.

A delegation was appointed to enquire into needed changes at the freight shed, freight rates and train services and to lay the matter before the Minister of Railways on his return to Campbellton.

WARD DONOHUE MEETS DEATH

Young Man, of Doyle's Brook Drowned in the Restigouche River

Byran Hennessy received a telegram Tuesday informing him that his brother, Ward Donohue, had been drowned on the headwaters of the Restigouche Monday morning. Deceased was employed with the Shives Lumber Co. Ltd. and it was while in their employ stream driving that the young man lost his life. He has been employed with this company for a number of years. Mr. Donohue formerly lived with his uncle, William Walsh, at Doyle's Brook, but of late years has been residing in Campbellton, he visited his brother here about a month ago. Deceased was well known on the Miramichi, and his many friends will be sorry to hear of his death. He leaves four sisters and two brothers to mourn. The sisters are Sister Mary Patricia of the Congregation de Notre-Dame, St. Louis, Kent Co.; Mrs. Ray Gullen, Campbellton; Margaret, Marysville, York Co.; Josie, Derby. The brothers are Bryan, residing here and Michael in the United States. Deceased was 31 years of age. The body has not yet been recovered.

DECISIVE VICTORY FOR QUEBEC LIBERALS

Hon. Mr. Gouin Has Large Majority—John H. Kelly an Easy Winner.

The Quebec provincial elections on Wednesday resulted in the return of the Gouin government by an increased majority. By the Redistribution Act passed at the last session of the legislature seven new seats were added and while the opposition captured three of these, it lost two others thus making the net gain in the Liberal majority in the new house six.

All of the members of the cabinet were re-elected, the only one to suffer defeat being the Hon. Charles Devlin in Temiskaming. Mr. Devlin was, however, successful in Nicolet county.

Premier Gouin was elected by large majorities in both Portneuf and St. John's.

Mr. Tellier, the opposition leader re-elected in Joliette, but two of his leading lieutenants, Armand Lavergne and Jules Prevost, both of whom ran in two counties, suffered defeat in one, Mr. Lavergne winning in Montmagny and losing in Montmorency, and Mr. Prevost suffered defeat in L'Assomption and winning in Terrebonne.

The parties stand with two deferred elections: Liberals, 62; Conservatives, 16; Labor, 2.

Mr. John Kelly was re-elected in Bonaventure Co. by 1500 majority.

Public Works Dept ST. JOHN FALLS

H. A. Chandler of Campbellton Engaged on Important Survey Work

WILL START SOON

H. A. Chandler, surveyor of the Provincial Department of Public Works, has a staff of men employed making the location survey for new bridge at the falls. A. R. Wetmore, chief engineer of the Public Works Department was in town and in company with Hon. Herbert Maxwell visited the site of the proposed bridge and made arrangements to have the survey work pushed forward as rapidly as possible. It is expected that it will take nearly two weeks to complete the location survey and provide all the information regarding the character of the foundation for the abutments, the distances, heights, angles, etc., necessary to enable the engineers to work out the detailed plans for the new bridge. The engineers of the Public Works Department have had the assistance of one of the best known engineers engaged in bridge construction in Canada in deciding on the general plans of the bridge, and when the location survey is available the detailed plans will be started before long.

The new bridge will be available for street cars as well as the ordinary vehicular traffic, and when constructed will cause a considerable increase in land value in Fairville and on the West Side generally. It is understood the Provincial Government has agreed to the proposition of the city to provide attachments for carrying water pipes across the bridge, so as to enable a connection to be made between the East and West Side water services in event of an accident to either service.

MORNE HOLDING ON TO HIS JOB AT OTTAWA

His Reported "Resignation" is Not Likely to Materialize for Some Time

That Hon. A. B. Morne, the chairman of the Public Service Investigation Commission intends to "finish his work" before tendering the resignation for which Premier Borden has asked, is evidenced by the fact that he has leased a residence here in Ottawa until October 1st.

It is stated that Mr. Morne takes the view that he is called upon to conclude every investigation which he commenced, and that will of course take considerable time.

An instance of his determination to prolong the term of his investigations as long as possible is mentioned in the case of the Printing Bureau. There a charge was made against one official, and it was understood by all concerned, that ended the investigation at the Bureau.

But Mr. Morne takes the view that he has not concluded the enquiry, and is now engaged in going through the whole of the Bureau, covering the same ground as was done by Hon. Charles Murphy two years ago.
