An Ex-Actor Charged With Murder.

New York, Dec. 17.—Robert Montgomery, formerly an actor, and at present a clerk in the Mott Iron Works, was arrested this morning on suspicion of having murdered his wife in their apartments on Twenty-fifth-street. The body of the young woman was found in the yard at the rear of the dwelling, half dressed. There was a pistol wound in the left breast, and as there was little blood to be seemed was evident that death had been almost instantaneous. Montgomery is 35 years old and the woman was 25. At the station house the prisoner said the dead woman had not been married to him, but had lived with him for a year. The young woman's name was Nellie Southwick. She came from Seneca Falls, N.Y., and worked as a dressmaker. Montgomery was discharged for lack of evidence.
