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CONGRESS AT A STANDSTILL

COMPELLED TO ADJOURN FOR WANT OF A QUORUM

Republicans Decline to Vote on the Report of the Ways and Means Committee on the Wilson Bill—Absence of the Democrats Makes Adjustment Impracticable.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—The House of Representatives gave another remarkable demonstration to-day of its inability to transact business against the will of an active and hostile minority.

THE PROPOSED PROGRAM.—The report on which the fight was made came from the Committee on Rules and was to the effect that the House should meet daily at 11 a.m., sit until 2 p.m., and then take recess till 8 p.m.

NO REPUBLICANS VOTED.—There was no objection indicated to these terms, but not a single Republican voted when his name was called.

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BRITISH WARSHIPS AT RIO.

A FORCE THERE "SUFFICIENT TO PERFORM ITS DUTY"

The Government confident that Captain Lang's Squadron can protect British interests in Brazil—Forty-Eight Hours to Constitute a Week's Work in the Arsenal Hereafter.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—In the House of Commons to-day further questions were asked regarding the situation in Rio Janeiro and the protection afforded British interests there.

Sir H. Kay-Shuttleworth, Secretary of the Admiralty, replied that there were four British warships at Rio Janeiro, which was a greater number than any other country had there.
