is coming into MANITOBA

Manitoba this year has the best crop of the entire prairie west and farmers throughout the province are rejoicing in the prospects of the happy combination of a large yield and a big price.

Premier John Bracken, who is also Minister of Agriculture, and a former President of the Manitoba Agricultural College-an expert agriculturist of nation-wide reputation-following a motor tour of the province for purposes of personal observation, issued the public statement on August 11th that Manitoba this year will have its biggest crop since 1915 and that it would be the biggest revenue producer since 1920.

The biggest crop since 1915 was harvested in 1922, when the yield was 19.42 bushels to the acre. So that Manitoba's wheat crop this year, according to Premier Bracken, may be expected to run close to 20 bushels to the acre, at least.

This would place Manitoba's yield from 2,459,408 acres in wheat, at roughly 49,188,160 bushels, against, 32,804,000 bushels last year-an increase of 16,384,160 bushels

The price of October wheat this year on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange is averaging 38 cents per bushel more than last year's October price. On this basis the Manitoba farmer, who received 67 cents per bushel at the farm for his wheat last year, will this year receive \$1.05.

The value to him of his wheat crop this year should be at least \$51,647,568-which is \$29,668,568 more than last year.

Furthermore in the above figures no account is taken of the grade which promises to average very much higher than last year.

The same condition applies in respect to his oats, rye, barley and flax. The yields are heavier than those of a year ago. The price of oats shows an advance of 15 cents per bushel; barley 25 cents a bushel; rye 25 cents a bushel and flax 21 cents a bushel, over 1923.

With a bigger crop, a higher price, lower freight rates by rail and anticipated lower freight rates for lake transport and with the added advantage of closer proximity to market than his brothers in Saskatchewan or Alberta, the grain growing operations of the Manitoba farmer this year will result in renewed prosperity and enhanced purchasing power.

The statistical information given above has been furnished by the Department of Agriculture of the Province of Manitoba and can therefore be regarded as authoritative.




Left On Steps of Owen Sound Shelter July 26. FRIENDS HONOR J. R. DIER

Departing Bank Manager Presented With Cabinet of Silver.


