THE Bachelor's Ball, which was to take place on Friday evening next at Boynton Hall will take place on the preceding evening, that is next Thursday evening. This change has been made out of courtesy to the Langvin Banquet.

Mr. McCORMICK is now a full fledged photographer. He has taken some excellent pictures lately. This morning he took the Church of the Redeemer, together with a group of leading citizens.

THE Reception Committee re Sir Hector Langevin's visit here, kindly return their thanks for the generous and courteous manner in which they have been dealt with in the matter of the Hall by the hall committee. Although the tickets and invitations were issued for the hall on Friday evening next, the managers have kindly consented to have the hall on Thursday evening in order to accommodate the reception committee and the public generally.

OUR special reporter brought in with him from Mr. Bunce's farm, High River, some splendid specimens of oats and wheat, some of which sown in the latter part of April is quite ripe and ready for the sickle. One bunch of oats measured 6 feet 2 inches, and numbered 43 stalks from a single seed. The wheat sown in April is very fine and ready for cutting. Mr. Bunce also sent in some fine onions. THE stories going the rounds of the press concerning the inhuman treatment of the man Pennocks are wholly denied. In justice to Sergt. Speer and Fickering the Nor-Western is authorized on unimpeached authority to state that there was no inhuman treatment in the case. It is true that a better conveyance might have been used at the time, but it was not known until afterwards that the unfortunate man was likely to become so violent. No inhumanity was intended.

A VERY pleasant little company assembled in Mr. Shelton's store this morning, the occasion being the presentation of a splendid photographic album to T. H. Schneider, Esq., on the occasion of his departure for Winnipeg. Mr. Schneider has been in business here some months past, and during his short stay here he has made a host of friends. He took his departure this afternoon for Winnipeg, where he will probably engage in business. The Nor-Western wishes Mr. Schneider many happy days.

We understand that the adjourned sitting of the District Court will be held in Calgary by Col. McLeod, Specially Magistrate, on Friday next 6th inst. For some reason best known to the Clerk of the Court we have not been favored with the advertisement of the holding of the Court. This is a matter which requires the utmost publicity and is certainly one in which no favoritism shall be shown. We are pleased to know that the Court will be held this time in Boynton Hall which will be much more convenient and suitable in every way than the police barracks.

The distinguished Minister of Public Works will arrive here on Friday next at noon. He will be met down the line by a special committee of the General Committee and at the station by the committee and citizens generally. An address of welcome will be presented to him on his arrival, and the banquet will take place in Boynton Hall in the evening. The committee are working energetically, and everything is being done to make the occasion a hearty welcome to the distinguished statesman and a credit to the town.

A meeting of gentlemen held to consider the best means of presenting a statement of our wants, wishes and grievances to the members of the Government who are expected within a short period to visit this section of country, it was determined to request the newspapers of Calgary to call upon everyone throughout the country to appoint a committee composed of Messrs. Bleeker, Geddes, McVitty, Elliott and Braden to whom a statement of their claims can be presented so that these may be submitted in proper form to the various ministers in accordance with the resolution. Any one wishing to have his wants known may state his wishes to any member of the committee. The opportunity is thus afforded to settlers to get their claims for land discussed, and it is hoped by this method a satisfactory solution may be arrived at.

The school meeting on last Wednesday evening was fairly attended. The chair was occupied by George Murdoch, Esq., and Mr. Howard Douglas was appointed secretary. A detailed statement of the receipts and expenditure was submitted by the secretary and treasurer, Mr. Douglas, which will be found elsewhere. Messrs. Frenze and Braden were appointed auditors. The accounts were examined and found correct, and the report of the auditors was adopted. The old trustees, Messrs. Douglas and McNeil were elected, and Mr. Frenze was elected in place of Mr. Costello, who has left the place. A resolution was passed to open two subscription lists, one for persons willing to subscribe for the term ending the 31st December. Mr. Douglas stated that the sum of \$250.00 would be required for the four months. The subscription list was opened and the sum of \$72.00 subscribed on the spot. Votes of thanks were passed to the trustees and to the chairman for the efficient manner in which they performed their duties.

BLAZE AT MCLEOD.

The Mounted Police Stable Cremated—Loss \$15,000.
Two stables of the North-west Mounted Police were destroyed by fire at Fort McLeod on the 28th inst. The fire broke out about a quarter past seven in the morning in a stable temporarily used as a barn, and in which hay was stored. The total absence of any reason or suspicion accounting for the origin of the fire has given rise to a general opinion that the hay must have heated and spontaneous combustion taken place. There was a considerable wind blowing when the fire was first noticed and which endangered the safety of other buildings. Every precaution appeared to have been taken by the police authorities to guard against accident by fire. The water reservoirs were full of water and the Babcock Fire Extinguisher brought into immediate use. It is generally conceded that a desperate and systematic fight was made to prevent a spreading of the flames, and the other stables and adjoining buildings were saved. The supply of water appears on the whole to have been good. The mechanics and laborers of the North-west Coal and Mining Company were working near the scene of the accident and used every means in their power to aid the police. None of the other buildings, comprising the police post at Fort MacLeod, have been in any way damaged.

Private advice received from England by the Dominion Government shows that the suggested entrance of Jamaica into the Dominion is not an idle story. Negotiations looking in that direction have been privately carried on for some time past. The underlying incentive is to find another permanent market for Jamaica sugar.

The secretary of the Historical Society's programs committee, Winnipeg, has received a telegram from Montreal stating that the deputation of one hundred and fifty members on the special excursion is timed to leave Owen Sound on Saturday evening, Sept. 6th, so that the deputation may be expected here on the evening of Tuesday, 9th September.
