Relation of the Missions to the Outouacs during the years 1670 and 1671.

EXPLANATION OF THE IDEA THAT SHOULD BE HELD REGARDING ALL THE MISSIONS INCLUDED UNDER THE NAME OUTAOUAC.

T is well to afford a general view of all these Outaouac territories, not only for the purpose of
designating the places where the Faith has been
proclaimed by the planting of Missions; but [88] also
because the King, by very recently taking possession
of them with a ceremony worthy of the eldest son of
the Church, and of a Most Christian King, put all
those tribes under the protection of the Cross before
receiving them under his own, being unwilling to
unfurl his standard before planting that of Jesus
Christ,—as will be set forth in the account to be
given of that act of taking possession.

By glancing, as one can, at the Map of the lakes, and of the territories on which are settled most of the tribes of these regions, one will gain more light upon all these Missions than by long descriptions that might be given of them.

The reader may first turn his eyes to the Mission of Sainte Marie du Sault, three leagues below the mouth of Lake superior. He will find it situated on
