There were about twenty-five present at the meeting and the list of members now embraces upwards of sixty names, and there is every prospect that the undertaking will be a success. Another meeting will be held shortly when matters will be placed in a proper shape for bringing about an exhibition in a short time.

DEATH OF LYNCHBURG

Died at Augusta, Ga., on the 21st ult., the thoroughbred racehorse and stallion Lynchburg, the property of Messrs. Lewis & Co., aged 12 years. He was bred by Maj. T. G. Bacon, South Carolina, and on the decease of that gentleman was purchased at the executor's sale of the estate by the present owners. Lynchburg was sired by imp. Leamington dam Neutralizer by Roverene; 2nd dam Sea Breeze, by imp. Arabian, 3rd dam Grey Norma, by imp. Leviathan; 4th dam Morgiana, by Pacolet, 5th dam Blanche, by Top Gallant; 6th dam by Lamington, 7th dam by Medley; 7th dam by Beech.

At the Nashville Fair, in 1886, he ran second to Maggie B. B. in the Young America Stake, one mile, in 1:45; Hamburg third, Enquirer and others not placed. As a three-year-old at Saratoga, in a mile and a half dash, he beat Ecliptus, Chilheothe and three others, and in the Continental Hotel Stakes at Long Branch, mile heats he won the first heat in 1:47, beating Enquirer, Maggie B. B., Susan Ann, etc.; but in the second heat injured his shoulder and was drawn. He never recovered from this injury and was retired from the turf, and thus cut off, in the beginning of a successful racing career, from taking rank with the best horses on the American turf.

As a stallion, Lynenburg has not, so far, proved a great success; but this, in a great measure, may be attributed to the fact that he never had the opportunity of serving first-class mares. The most successful of his get is the filly Mayflower, foaled in 1874, out of a mare by Congaree, who as a two year old won a half-mile dash at Washington, D. C., with 97 lbs up, in 51½ seconds, and a mile dash at Camden, S. C., over a heavy track, in 1:50. Some of his young stock, however, are very promising.

ACCIDENT IN A SHOW RING

The Hamilton Spectator has the following account of an accident which happened last week at the Central Fair during the contest for the best lady rider.—The great event to which all had been looking forward during the afternoon was the lady horseback riding, and after some little delay two competitors came forward—Miss Wooley, of Gianford, and Miss M. Van Wagner of Stoney Creek. Each lady was well mounted and attended by a gallant squire, but there was some disappointment expressed at their being only two contestants. As matters turned out, however, there was excitement enough to satisfy the strongest craving. There was some yeast to be seen in all directions around the grounds, sample packages having been freely distributed during the day. This yeast is claimed to be the yeast *par excellence*, but may fairly be assumed that it never before occasioned such a fermentation as it did on this occasion. While Miss Wooley and her escort were galloping at a pretty fast rate round the north side of the ring some person threw a package of yeast which struck the latter's horse on the head, causing him to shy suddenly. Miss Wooley's horse was also affected by the occurrence, and he came almost to a full stop, throwing the lady violently to the ground, and in the stir which followed, her attendant was also thrown, both horses starting off in wild terror without the riders. Miss Wooley was picked up instantly, and Dr. White, who was present, was prompt in attendance. It was soon discovered that the lady received no injury beyond being partially stunned, and the general attention was then directed to the horses, which were galloping round the ring at a tremendous rate. Quite a number were gathered inside the ring, and they made fruitless efforts to stop the animals, now almost frantic with the yells of those on the outside. Several times they charged full for the fence, and were only kept from jumping into the crowd by and by the vigorous waving of hats, canes, umbrellas, etc. After matters had gone on in this way for about fifteen minutes, Mr. Fred. Ashbaugh, a well-known Hamilton horseman, came into the ring with the intention of stopping the little game. This he did in a most gallant manner, stationing himself on the inside of the course taken by the horses, and as they rushed past he seized the bridle-rein of one of them, and after some severe pulling, brought him to a stand still. The other, deprived of his mate, seemed to have lost any desire for further racing, and was soon captured. Mr. Ashbaugh certainly deserves credit for the part he played in the matter. Miss Van Wagner then rode round the ring several times, showing plainly that she was a most accomplished equestrienne, and she received the first prize, the second being given to her less fortunate rival. We are glad to say that Miss Wooley left the grounds quite restored from the effects of the mishap. Diligent search was made for the individual who threw the package of yeast, but he very prudently kept out of the way.
