### CONTRACTS OPEN.

GODERICH, ONT.—New piers are to be built in the harbor next summer.

RODNEY, ONT.—The ratepayers are considering a proposition for the erection of a roller flour mill in this village.

GEORGETOWN, ONT.—It is said that Messrs. Newton Bros. will form a joint stock company to build a woolen factory here.

RENFREW, ONT.—A \$75,000 butter factory may be established here. Mr. A. A. Wright is at the head of the movement.

MONTMORENCY FALLS, ONT.—The proprietors of the cotton mills intend to erect a new wing 300 feet long and three stories high.

DUTTON, ONT.—The Farmers' Building Society, of Dunwich, contemplate erecting a large grist mill here during the coming spring.

BRESLAU, ONT.—Debentures will be issued to cover the cost of erecting a new school in school section No. 11; A. S. Clemmer, Sec.-Treasurer.

WINDSOR MILLS, QUE. The Canada Paper Co. will erect a dam across the St. Francis River, near this place, from which to obtain power for their mills.

BRANTFORD, ONT.—Owing to the recent flood, the main outflow pipe of the sewage system may have to be extended 1000 feet further down the river.

SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I.—Mr. George Baker of this town has prepared plans for a new brick store to be erected by Mr. R. T. Holman adjoining his warehouse.

LEVIS, QUE.—It has been estimated by Councillor Branlieu that a complete system of waterworks for the town would cost about \$150,000. No action in the matter has yet been taken.

HULL, QUE.—Tenders are being asked by the Quebec Government for the furniture and fixtures for the new court house and goal building. Tenders for the walls to surround the goal will also be asked for at an early date.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, MAN.—Hon. M. Watson has introduced a bill in the Manitoba Legislature authorizing the town to issue debentures to the amount of \$25,000 for the erection of a new court house. The bill will in all probability be sanctioned by the Government.

SARNIA, ONT.—Mr. H. G. Phillips, architect, is preparing plans for a new hotel for Mr. Joseph Peterson, to be built on the Lambton House property on Christian street. It will be three stories high, of red brick, heated by steam and will cost about \$10,000.

ST. THOMAS, ONT. Tenders are invited by the Public Works Committee until to-morrow (Friday) for building a sewer from St. Catherine street along Kains, Malakoff and Alma streets, to Woodworth avenue; A. W. Campbell, City Engineer.—It is understood that Messrs. Keith Bros. intend rebuilding the flax mill at the foot of George street recently destroyed by fire.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C.—A deputation from this city recently waited on the Provincial Government asking for substantial aid towards the construction of the Fraser river bridge and the building of a railway from Delta to this city. The deputation were favorably received.

OTTAWA, ONT.—A deputation of aldermen recently waited upon the Minister of Railways and Canals to urge the erection of a bridge across the canal at Concession street, in which case the county would also build one across the Rideau river; the scheme will be given consideration.

LONDON, ONT.—A petition has been presented to the Ontario Legislature asking authority to issue debentures for \$110,000 for the purpose of paying for the substitution of iron for wood in the bridges along the London and Port Stanley railway, which the city has leased from the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company. Mr. Wm. Johnson will erect a residence on William street.

BARRIE, ONT.—Thos. Kennedy & Co., architects, have received instructions from Mr. M. McConnell, of Toronto, to prepare plans for the erection of a large wing to the Peninsula Park hotel. The addition will contain a large ball room, billiard rooms, parlors and about 50 bed rooms. They have also prepared plans for a five room brick school at Sudbury, Ont., and a brick Methodist church at New Lowell. Tenders for these buildings will be called for immediately.

WINDSOR, ONT.—The town authorities are applying to the Ontario Legislature for power to issue new debentures and to increase the debenture debt of the town to the sum of \$500,000 for the purpose of extending the water mains and connections and constructing a new intake pipe.—The Bruce Avenue Baptist church has been found to be too small to accommodate the congregation and the building will have to be enlarged or a new one erected. It is also proposed to enlarge St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church by building an addition to the south end.

HAMILTON, ONT.—It has been decided by the officials of the local Methodist churches to erect a new church in the south-eastern portion of the city, and a committee has been appointed with that end in view.—A building permit has been granted to Mrs. Sullivan for a two story brick dwelling, corner Market and Caroline streets, to cost \$1,200. Mr. J. J. Morehouse, of the proposed smelting works, was in the city recently in connection with the awarding of contracts for the supply of materials. 800 cords of stone.
