EMIGRANT PAUPERS .- The city of Boston has adopted means to prevent the shipment of European paupers to that port. Four paupers were last week anaigned before a justice in that city, on a joint charge of being " foreign paupers receiving aid from the city of Boston, against the Peace of the Commonwealth, and contrary to the law in such case made and provided." The charge of pauperism was sustained, and the court ordered the prisoners to be returned to the Queen of Great Britain. A LOST VESSEL COME TO LIGHT.-HER CREW MURDERED BY THE MORMONS.—A rumor has been current for several days on our docks that the schooner Robert Willis, whose sudden disappearance on Lake Michigan last fall was noticed at the time, and of which no intelligence was ever afterwards received, had been captured by the Mormons of Beaver Island, her captain and erew massacred, and the vessel unloaded and scuttled. At the time of her loss, the Willis was bound from Chicago to this port with a cargo of wheat, and was last seen by the schooner Lansing, on the 22nd of November, off Sheboygan, bound up the Lake in a very heavy north-east gale. The news of her capture, &c., is said to have been received through a Mormon who escaped from the community at Beaver Island, and who has made oath to the facts above stated. It is also stated that the U.S. steamer Michigan has been sent to the Island to look into the affair.—Buffalo Republic.
