this motion, if the house will so consent. I believe the hon. member for Bow River made an agreement to withdraw his motion. Because and only because I would not leave a fellow parliamentarian, for whom I have very deep respect, in breach of his understanding, I give my consent.

The basic theory of our parliamentary system of government is the full accountability of the complete public service to this high court of parliament. The electoral boundaries commissions and the representation commissioner have taken the attitude that they are above and beyond parliament and not accountable to it, and that their papers are privileged and not open to parliamentary review. Therefore, with all the emphasis at my command, I assert that this is a travesty upon parliamentary government. I also want to say that I shall seek another early opportunity to bring to account the regrettable arrogance of the representation commissioner and the electoral boundaries commissions. It is only on that basis that I give my consent to the withdrawal.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Rinfret): Does the hon. member for Bow River have unanimous consent to withdraw notice of motion No. 121 standing in his name?

Some hon. Members: Agreed.

Order discharged and motion withdrawn.

Mr. MacEachen: Mr. Speaker, there has been some suggestion that we rise till seven o'clock for a supper adjournment. If that is agreeable to the house it is agreeable to the government.

The Acting Speaker (Mr. Rinfret): Is it agreeable to hon. members that we suspend private members' hour?

Some hon. Members: Agreed.

MEDICARE—AUTHORIZATION OF CONTRIBU-TIONS TOWARD COST OF INSURED MEDICAL CARE

The house resumed consideration of the motion of Mr. MacEachen for the second reading of Bill C-227, to authorize the payment of contributions by Canada toward the cost of insured medical care services incurred by provinces pursuant to provincial medical care insurance plans, and the amendment thereto of Mr. Allard.

The amendment was reserved to give the Chair an opportunity to look at it, and also to give hon. members an opportunity to give some thought to it from a procedural standpoint. I would ask for comments which hon. members might like to make at this time.
