Three Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received:-

Of the Nelson and Fort Sheppard Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing them to construct, equip, work and maintain a telegraph line and

telephone lines along the whole length of their railway and branches, &c.

Of John Kennedy and others, Provisional Directors of The Lindsay, Bobcavgeon and Pontypool Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the commencement and completion of the said railway for the terms of two and five years, respectively.

Of the Nipissing and James' Bay Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act consolidating the several Acts affecting their railway, amending their bonding

powers, and for other purposes.

Of the St. Lawrence and Adirondack Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act confirming a certain lease and agreement entered into by them with the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada, by which they have leased that portion of the latter Company's Railway lying between Beauharnois and Valleyfield, for the period of ninety-nine years.

Of the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada; praying for the passing of an Act confirming a certain lease and agreement entered into by them with the St. Lawrence and Adirondack Railway Company, by which they have leased to the said company that portion of their line of railway lying between Beauharnois and Valleyfield, for the

period of ninety-nine years.
