

Quebec Will Get Its Growth Through Pontville



Nobody will deny that Quebec has entered an era of full development. The gigantic works that will turn the port of Quebec into the best harbor on the Continent will widely extend Quebec's imports and exports.

You know that nothing will leave Quebec, nothing will be brought to Quebec without passing the Quebec Bridge, the door that will open the Port of Quebec to at least **ELEVEN RAILROADS**. **PONTVILLE** is the only land subdivision exactly facing the Quebec Bridge, its freight yards, etc.

All the railway trains coming to Quebec or leaving Quebec will have to pass through the Freight Yards at **Pontville**, where they will be shunted, sorted and made up for the journey, East and West. This work of preparing hundreds of trains a day, will keep heavy gangs of men busy the whole year round.

Pontville is recognized as the undeniable town of the G.T.P., in the immediate suburbs of Greater Quebec.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is the hope of Quebec, and it will be the source of its future development, but **Pontville** will have the very first opportunities, as it faces the Quebec Bridge, the G.T.P. Terminals, Freight Yards, Shops, etc., etc.

Pontville, as you can easily ascertain, is not an out-of-the-way town, with mere prospects as a future. It stands only 4½ miles West of Quebec City and, actually, the Quebec County Railway reaches a point only a mile or so distant from **Pontville**.

Before 1914 is over, **Pontville** will have its tramway service linking it with the City of Quebec.

Excellent highways give easy access to **Pontville** from the city, while in a very short time, eleven railway companies will have regular trains running between **Pontville** and the City of Quebec.

If you settle down at **Pontville**, you will first derive a vast benefit from the immense works under way, there. You will stand in the midst of a thriving district humming with activity, amongst a happy, busy, prosperous population of 10,000.
