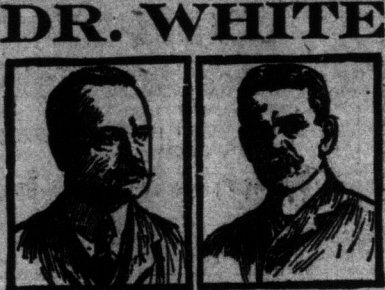
Central Athletes Make Records At Rochester--Win at Basketball

The Central "Y" Track Team invaded Rochester on Saturday and made a very good showing, considering the disadvantage of the track which is a square corner affair, 25 laps to the mile, and the fact that the Central team was not in the 100 yards and both Jack Tredder and Harry Cook broke the record for the 400 yards. The old mark was 2:15.5 and Tredder made the distance in 2:11.5 and Cook in 2:11.5, for which they received the ovation of the night. The running high jump was a spectacular event in which Carl Maier, Rochester's champion, and Bill Marshall, did at five feet six inches. In the jump off, Marshall got in his first try while Maier knocked the bar down three times. Lieut. Jim Gairdner won the 12 pound shot with a put off, 35 feet, 3 inches, which he can make it 41 feet when the Yankees come here on the 20th. The Toronto men were unfortunate in the 100 yards race. They won the three heats, but Charlie Kelley and Chas. Theobald were both disqualified for dropping their last block on the floor. Kelley's time of 14.5 seconds equalled the record for the event.
