

# GREAT GROWTH OF C. P. R. IN 26 YEARS

In 1886 Mileage Controlled Was 4315, Now It's 16,000—No Steamships Then and 75 Now—Earnings Have Increased from \$3,225,217 to More Than \$40,000,000.

Twenty-six years ago to-day the first transcontinental train of the C. P. R. left Dalhousie station for the Pacific Coast. The western terminus was then Fort Moody, which was shortly after changed to Vancouver, and the eastern terminus of the road was Montreal, and not St. John, N.B., as it is to-day. During the interval marvelous changes have taken place in the growth of the company as well as in the development of the country. At that time there were many who despaired of the future of the C. P. R., and imagined that the attempt of Canada to build a railway across the continent was an act of supreme folly. Labourers' death in England poured forth a sad tale of woe and called it "the biotic," which would soon be pricked, and expressed a doubt about its completion. The country which it was to traverse was entirely barren and forbidding, and, as it is said, amongst other things, "if any railway would not galvanize it into prosperity." History tells altogether a different tale.

**Still Increasing.** In 1886 the mileage controlled by the C. P. R. amounted to 4315 miles. To-day it is over 16,000 miles—and still steadily increasing. The company had no steamships in 1886. To-day there are about 75 in commission, sailing on the waters of the Atlantic and the Pacific, on the Great Lakes and in the inland waters of British Columbia. In 1886 the locomotives numbered 328 as against 1845 in 1912; there were 7323 freight cars in 1886 and 62,488 to-day, with large orders for both kinds of equipment. And so it is with the sleepers and diners and parlor and first-class passenger cars. In each there is an equally marked increase. Its observation cars have even invaded Austria, where they are operated on the state railway of that country.

The earnings, too, show a remarkable growth. In 1886 the gross earnings amounted to \$3,225,217, and the net earnings to \$2,225,217. After twenty-six years the gross earnings have grown to over \$40,000,000 and the net earnings to over \$20,000,000.

Land and Irrigation. With its steamship, telegraph, express and hotel systems, the company has also established a natural resources department, which looks after its lands and irrigation schemes and mining interests and business opportunities that are ever opening along the road, and this department is also making a complete register of all business and openings along the line of the C. P. R. The company builds its own locomotives and cars at large shops located on different parts of its lines; it looks after the welfare of its 30,000 employees, establishes Y.M.C.A. institutions, organized a pension department by which employees after ten years' service, upon reaching the age of 65, can retire on not less than \$20 a month, furnishes ready-made farms for a cer-

tain class of settlers, encourages others by generous loans to come to Canada, operates demonstration farms, and runs better farming special trains by which farmers are taught the latest and most profitable methods of farming, and deservedly earns the distinctive title of "Providence Incorporated," which was bestowed upon it by an eminent foreigner after he had traveled over the system.

## SARNIA POWER PLANT BURNED

Loss Reaches \$100,000 and Inconvenience to Public Is Great—Cause a Mystery.

**SARNIA, June 28.—(Special.)**—A disastrous fire occurred here this morning at 10.30, when the electrical plant of the Sarnia Gas and Electric Light Co. was totally destroyed. Only the smoke stack and boilers of the plant are left and the whole town is without power on light, excepting natural gas. The origin of the fire is a mystery as it started in the dead end of the building, where there was not a wheel turning and spread so rapidly that the head engineer was compelled to crawl on his hands and knees to pull out the switch.

An inspection of the plant, which was undergoing improvements, had been made by three of the directors only fifteen minutes before the outbreak, and they were but a short distance away when the end of the building was blown out thru a steam pipe bursting. No one was injured, but that something more serious did not happen is a miracle, as the big gas main passes thru the basement. Streams of water were used by the Cleveland-Sarnia Saw Mills Co. before the city brigade arrived, which had the effect of flooding the basement before the lead of the gas main melted, and which saved their own plant, which is only a couple of hundred feet away. The estimated damage to the company is about \$100,000, and to the people dependent on this source for power, the inconvenience is great. The directors are negotiating with the Grand Trunk to load their wires from the tunnel power. In the meantime, no street cars can be run. In any event, it will be some time before the power can be utilized.

**NOT SUFFICIENT HORSE TROUGHS**

That Present Number Be Augmented by Several More Is Recommendation of Humane Society.

That the number of horse troughs in the city is insufficient was the opinion expressed at a meeting of the board of directors of the Toronto Humane Society yesterday afternoon. The Toronto Owners' Association have protested against the recent removal of the trough that was at the corner of Parliament and Queen-streets, and the society has interested itself in the matter, with the result that the present number, 36, may be increased by eight or ten in the near future.

Messrs. J. M. Wilson, P. A. Manning, with Col. Stinson and General Manager P. C. Harris, were named a committee to complete negotiations for the purchase of an electric horse ambulance, to cost in the neighborhood of \$4000. The ambulance will be a motor-trail to the late Miss Gwynne, by whose will the society was left \$25,000.

The manager's report showed the number of complaints received so far

this month to be 156. For the corresponding period last year there were 113 cases dealt with. Inspector Kennedy reported 62 prosecutions for cruelty to animals since May 1. The police had investigated 42 complaints and had warned the offenders.

The next meeting of the board will be called on Sept. 26. As Humane Officer Jackson is at present on his vacation, his place is being filled by P. C. Cathers.
