ONE FRENCH REGIMENT IMMORTALIZES ITSELF

With the British Army in France, April 26.—One French regiment, to which had been entrusted the defense of the crest of Mount Kemmel, with orders to hold it to the last man, immortalized itself in yesterday's battle. Throughout the long, bitter day they clung to their post, and sent swirling streams of death from their machine guns down the slopes into struggling masses of German infantry which had surrounded the hill and was trying to battle to the top.

Some of these fearless poilus at the latest reports were still there, and the stoic chatter of their rapid-firers sent out the message to their general that they were obeying his order to hold or die.

Along the Ypres-Kemmel railway the defenders held for a considerable time, and inflicted heavy losses on the attacking troops.

Farmers on Rampage Against New Draft Law

Godrich, April 24.—A largely-attended meeting of farmers of Cecil and Ashfield Townships was held at Lennox last night to discuss the exemption of farmers from military service. It was decided to send delegates to join a provincial deputation of farmers to wait upon the government at Ottawa to urge the necessity of keeping all available help on the farms if the production plans for the coming season are to be carried out.

Montreal Produce Market

Montreal, April 26.—There were no further developments in the local food market today. The domestic trade in spring wheat flour is steady, there being a fair demand for
