Since coming into effect of the proclamation granting amnesty to military defaulters and deserters who reported to the military authorities on or before Aug. 24, today, a total of 25 defaulters in Toronto military district had, up to last night, reported. In addition, about ten men, whose units are now overseas, also gave themselves up. They were deserters.

The reason for the results of the annesty proclamation being so small in this mil tary district is that 75 per cent. of the Military Service Act absentees in Toronto military district are French-Canadians, who gave their addresses as points in Northern Ontario, and who returned to the Province of Quebec almost immediately after last Christmas time or the first day of this

The balance of the men still listed as M.S.A. defaulters may be accounted for as men who have changed their addresses and thru ignorance of the law failed to notify the registrar and thus have not received the registrar and thus have not received the registrar's orders to report. They are, therefore, not aware that they are military ab-
