MARTIAL LAW FOR SOME TIME.

U. S. Minister Reports Causes and

Events at Tokio.

Oyster Bay, N.Y., Sept. 11.—The following

cablegram, dated Sept. 10, from the

United States Minister, Grison, on the

conditions in Tokio, was made public

to-day by the president:

"The violence to a few foreigners, and

the attacks on Christian churches, should

not be considered to indicate any general

and foreign or anti-Christian feeling.

The former was quite incidental,

and the latter due to sporadic anarchy

in the Russian church and some

native Christians. The mob offered to

spare one American church if the minister

could show an American flag; unfortunately

he could not.

"Newspapers have during many

months raised popular expectation

high that intense dissatisfaction with

the terms of peace resulted. Sentiment

among the army, navy and nobility

is understood to be more conservative.

Six newspapers have been

suspended. Martial law probably will

continue for some time, thus insuring

quiet. Meanwhile the legion guards

of twelve soldiers will continue."

COUNCIL DIVIDES ON POINT

Controller Hubbard Against Taking

in South Strip—Opposition

to Speedway.

With the end of the summer resting

spell and the entering upon the last

municipal lap, the city council at its

opening sitting yesterday seemed con-

tent to avoid hitting up anything that

approached a fast gallop. There were four

absentees, Controller Shaw, Ald. Shaw,

The proceedings dragged somewhat,

On the question of widening Queen

street, Controller Hubbard declared

himself opposed to going ahead with

any plan. Ald. Stewart, however, who

was in the minority, declared that the

owners would consent to letting go their

city. He suggested that the strip re-

quired be taken off the city hall and

that the corners of Bay-street be

rounded. Controller Spence said that

the lawn acquisition idea would defeat

two objects of the widening, the

cornering of the roller track from

West Queen-street. Cities no larger

than Toronto were going to enormous

expense in getting streets widened.

As the bylaw merely provided for the

securing of a joint report from the city

engineer and assessment commission,

there was no objection raised to its

passing.

The city engineer and assessment com-

missioner were also authorized to

report upon the extension of James-street

to Richmond-street.

Dr. Sheard Thinks New York's System

of Street Cleaning Too Costly.

Dr. Sheard, who has just returned

from New York, is not impressed with

the adaptability of the system of street

cleaning and garbage collection there

to conditions in Toronto.

"It is far too costly," he said. "The

streets are cleaned by the municipali-

ties, which also looks after the gar-

bage collection, but the departments are

separate. The city is divided into 15

sections and 13 districts, and each dis-

trict has a superintendent, who ar-

ranges for the work, supplies and put-

ting into operation of the machinery

of the street cleaning. He is assisted

by the street cleaning committee, the

average is one man to two blocks.

The street cleaning committee is

composed of the city engineer, the

city clerk, the city treasurer, the

city auditor, the city assessor, the
