LABOR TROUBLES.

Editor World: The solution of the labor problems rests with the producers themselves. Production by employers on the one hand and employees on the other has failed to satisfy either party, the distribution of the product being the stumbling block. Common sense would indicate that the workers should cooperate and produce without the aid of employers, and so end the recurrence of strikes and lockouts.

Legislation which is supposed to enact laws for the greatest good of the greatest number is at fault in that it does not safeguard the rights of the workers. Under present conditions we are told that labor and capital (also land) are the factors in the production of wealth, yet labor, which is the creation of God, is ignored, and capital, the production of man, alone is considered. Labor is degraded to the condition of a commodity, and the workers are treated as slaves.

Parliament, which grants charters to corporations for the purpose of engaging in manufacturing or transportation, is quite right in granting such privilege to the shareholders of such corporations, but when they assume substitutes to do such manufacturing, then the legislative body which granted the charters should determine as to whether the substitutes should not be considered as partners in the industry, and as such should have a voice in the apportionment of the product. At present the employees claim the business as their own, and the substitute (labor) has only to be obedient and accept the share which the employer chooses to give. Is it any wonder that the workers should be dissatisfied? Parliament authorizes the issuing of a substitute for money to move crops, and permits interest to be charged on it. Why then, should the shareholder be on an equality in the apportionment of the product of the industry? He should be on an equality in the apportionment of the product of the industry, and so aid in relieving labor from the thralldom of employers whose arrogance is a menace to the welfare of the country.

Meanwhile, licenses should be required to be taken out by corporations or others employing labor, and in the event of any trouble with their employees, the license of the corporation or employer refusing the offices of the department of labor in settlement of any dispute, should be revoked and the cancellation of their charters should result.

THE SOURCE OF LYNCHING.

Mr. Goldwin Smith has the following letter in The New York Sun on the recent lynching festivals in the republic: "Lynching" is the ghastly heading of a despatch recounting a gathering of 2000 American citizens for the purpose of hanging or burning a negro. The negro is lynchable, and his dignity is not to be touched. But of what, when roused, he is capable, Santo Domingo knows too well. In Jamaica the whites are immensely outnumbered by the blacks, and the sexual morality of the blacks is said to be very loose; yet we do not hear of any lynching of the whites by the white women of that island.

The black footman in "Thackeray's 'Newcomes'" is a type of those who are used to the law to political equality and social rivalry with their former masters. I have seen a black bishop dining in the premier club in London; and at Oxford nobody was shocked when a black youth from Jamaica entered and graduated there.

These examples seem to suggest that antagonism of race rather than negro propensity may be the main source of the danger.

The presence of the white race from the black is general. But this intense antagonism seems limited to a country in which the blacks are emancipated slaves raised by law to political equality and social rivalry with their former masters. I have seen a black bishop dining in the premier club in London; and at Oxford nobody was shocked when a black youth from Jamaica entered and graduated there.

That may seem to suggest a hope that immigration from countries where the sharp antagonism does not prevail, should it take place on a large scale, will create a neutral element to mediate between the deposed slave owner and the emancipated slave.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

QUIN POLITICS, IS ADVICE PREACHER GIVES TO WOMEN

Rev. Dr. Lyle Tells National Council to Leave Combat to Sterner Sex.

Hamilton, Oct. 15.—"Shun politics," was the advice Rev. Dr. Lyle, who presided at this evening's session in the lecture hall of Centenary Methodist Church gave to the National Council of Women. He said that he hoped the day was fast disappearing when women would enter the political field and let themselves be kicked about like football from one party to another. He also cautioned against signing or doing anything that would cause friction with the French-Canadian, of whom he spoke in the highest terms.

Mrs. Sanford gave an address on "The International Council." Mrs. Willoughby Cummings, Toronto, followed with an address on the coming quinquennial meeting of the International Council. Mrs. John Patterson, Toronto, also read a paper on arts and handicrafts. The session closed with a paper by Mrs. Dignam, Toronto, on the handicrafts of youth.

The closing session will be held tomorrow behind closed doors, when the subject of traffic in white slaves and political equality will be discussed. The new officers will also be chosen.

At this afternoon's session Professor R. Harcourt, Guelph, read a paper on the adulteration of food. He said that there was a difference of opinion about the wholesomeness of so-called chemical preservatives used, but it was generally agreed that formaldehyde and fluorides were injurious. He regretted the extravagant claims made by manufacturers about the nutritive qualities of breakfast foods, for he said that common oatmeal, cornmeal, etc., were just as good. Nearly all the adulterated goods, he said, were sold in a normally committed state had preservatives in them. Fruits, jams, sauces, spices were also frequently adulterated.

Miss Carey, factory inspector for Ontario West, said the law was well carried out with reference to women and children, but some of the food factories might be cleaner.

Miss McNaughton, Montreal, thought the official organ of the council ought to be discontinued, but it was agreed to continue it.

At this morning's session Mrs. Hoodless, who was not satisfied with the appointment of a committee on political equality for the sexes, tried to have the matter re-opened. Dr. Stowe-Gullen, Toronto, advised that Mrs. Hoodless had out of order, and Mrs. Hoodless had to content herself with giving a notice of motion that she would seek to have the matter re-opened Tuesday morning. Her idea is that efforts should be made to better the condition of the weaker sex rather than to seek political equality.

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MAY CAUSE SPLIT.

Report of Street Railway Arbitrators Not Altogether Satisfactory.

Hamilton, Oct. 15.—(Special).—The arbitrators' award may cause a split in the Street Railwaymen's Union. It is probable that Rev. H. B. Britton, Montreal, acting rector of Christ Church Cathedral, will be appointed rector of St. Matthew's Church.

To-day Col. Gibson and other officers are inspecting the ground on which the Thanksgiving Day manoeuvres will be held.

The marriage of Ald. J. M. Eastwood and Miss Florence Gibson, daughter of Senator Gibson, will take place in the Beamesville Presbyterian Church, on Nov. 1.

Archibald Lancelotti this morning pleaded guilty to holding up John Allan, and was remanded for a week for sentence.
