



30,000 WITHOUT FOOD.

Lawlessness at Lodz Increasing\_ Laborers Turn Murderers.

Lodz, Dec. 8 .- By the recent closing of factories here 30,000 persons are without food.

Demonstrations by lawless persons are increasing and the feud between the Nationalists and Socialist laborers is being renewed. Laborers during the past two days
