WANT TOLL FROM BICYCLISTS

Road Companies Take Action to Tax Hamilton Wheelmen.

Reform Party Arrange Their Platform—Deputation to Manager Hays—Highlanders and Greens Invited to Hamilton on the 24th—Amateur Theatricals Set a Success in the Ambitious City—Day Among the Churches.

Hamilton, April 17.—(Special.)—When Mr. J. R. Moulton began to speak along the city streets in his Winton horseless carriage he little thought he was starting an important fight between the toll road companies that, like an octopus, have the city in their tentacles, and the bicyclists who have turned out in the country and paid no toll at the gates through which he passed. The swift gliding carriage brought to the mind of Mr. Frank Carpenter, secretary of the companies, the thought that through it could be tested in the courts the right of toll road companies to collect toll from bicyclists. He proposes to first charge Mr. Moulton, and if the case is lost by the companies he will proceed to extract toll from the bicyclists' pockets. Mr. Carpenter is apparently confident of victory, as he has proclaimed that he will give the bicyclists a month's notice to pay the toll. The proposed action has aroused the wheemen's ire and the Hamilton Association, which has been consulted by Mr. Moulton, says the toll road companies have no case. In his opinion the action will only do for the collection of toll on vehicles drawn by horses or other animals. The meeting of the Hamilton Association will be held on Tuesday evening to consider the matter.

General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk who has been consulted by the Board of Trade, on the matters of stock exchange, and the party of city merchants and business men, are to meet at the Hotel Hamilton on Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock.

ACCIDENTS AND A FATALITY.

Arthur Pettit Was Killed on the Railway Tracks at Parkdale.

Alfred W. Smith Thrown From His Horse on Avenue Road and Seriously Injured—Samuel Nunn, a Bicyclist, Run Over by a Coal Cart on King Street West—Vernon Callan the Victim of a Runaway on Varsity Grounds.

Arthur Pettit, an 11-year-old lad, whose home was at 90 Northcote-avenue, was fatally injured on the G.T.R. tracks near the Queen-street subway on Saturday. The lad was walking along the track, and it is supposed that he tried to board a flat car on an east-bound G.T.R. train, when he missed his hold, and fell under the wheels. When the train passed he was crushed and his body was run over. Mr. Pettit was taken to the hospital, but he died there on Sunday.

Alfred W. Smith, the well-known insurance man, was riding on a horseback on Avenue Road on Saturday afternoon, accompanied by Messrs. Mara and Strick, who were going to join the horse show at the annual show at the Varsity Grounds. The animal, a black and white horse, was unmanageable and ran away, and Alfred was thrown from his horse. He was taken to the hospital, but he died there on Sunday.
