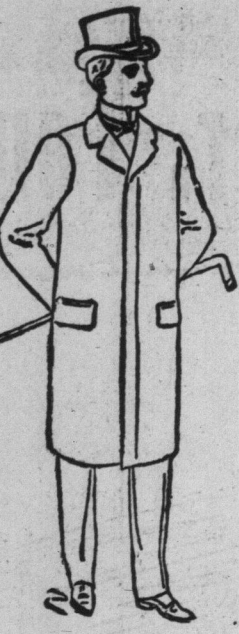

WEDDED ON HIS WEDDING DAY

Sensational Performances of Miller,
the Bike Grinder.

Completed 2007 Miles and Married

New York, Dec. 10.—At 10 o'clock to-night the six-day race ended with the following scores accomplished:

The condition of the racing men at the close of the six-day race was something marvelous. Their speed, instead of diminishing, increased, and miles were ridden as low as 230. Never in the history of long-distance racing did men ever finish so fresh as in this race, and the Health Board was unable to bring the slightest charge of cruelty against the race, owing to the superb condition of the men. Charlie Miller entered the race balancing the scales at exactly 133½ pounds. When he was weighed to-night it was found that he had gained one pound. The champion was happy and in the best of spirits, and the way he cut circles around the track made the spectators dizzy watching him. Frank Waller, known as "Oysters," who took second position in the great race, and who gave Charlie Miller the hardest race of his life, is over 40 years old, and his performance at that age will always remain a mystery. He is as tough as an alligator, and there is no end to his endurance.

Waller passed Miller's record of last year to-night at 9:12 o'clock, covering 1983 miles in 141 hours and 2 minutes. Miller covered the same distance in 136 hours 41 minutes and 5 seconds.

Waller was cheered in Madison-square Garden at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon one of the most novel, the most sensational and most solemn scenes that have ever witnessed in the history of the sporting world. Novelty was sought and obtained, solemnity was entirely forgotten, but also

Happenings of a Day.

Frederick Mott, a Buffalo barge, hanged himself on Saturday.

James Quinn, a License Commissioner of Ottawa, died yesterday.

The Scotch coal-owners are about to enter into a combination to strengthen their interests.

There is no truth in the story that the Crown Prince of Germany will visit the United States next year.

Col. W. J. Bryan intends, it is said, to at once resign the command of his regiment, the Third Nebraska, which is now at Savannah, Ga.

Hon. E. G. Rathbone of Ohio, ex-Assistant Secretary-General, has been appointed to be in charge of the postal service in Cuba. He will leave for Havana in a few days.

Foot and mouth disease, one of the most feared of animal maladies, is raging in the district of Hainaut, Belgium. One hundred and fifty-two stables in 52 communes are said to be affected.

The State of Massachusetts is preparing to send a small expedition to the shores of Cape Cod in order to pick up the bodies of the steamer Portland victims, who were killed by a damper upon the ship.

There are discouraging rumors about the prospects of the Paris Exposition of 1900. The unmet condition of affairs at the Exposition has thrown a damper upon the project, and there is some talk of postponing it till 1901.

On Friday a New York minister's wife confessed that she was a shoplifter and was released. On Saturday Mrs. Laura Swift, wife of Rev. Albert Swift, secretary of the Metropolitan Federation of Epworth Leagues, was arrested on the same charge.
