Bishop of Niagara Preached, Sketching the History of the Church's Work.

Yesterday the festival services connected with the centenary of St. James' Anglican Cathedral began. Holy communion was celebrated at 8 o'clock, and at morning prayer a full choral service, with special music, had been arranged. The nave was decorated with flags, Union Jacks and red ensigns, being arranged in pairs on the capitals of the columns, while in the chancel hung the famous red cross flag of the royal navy, and the Union Jacks. Horns supplemented the organ, and broke in with telling effect during the rendering of the musical numbers.

At morning prayer there was a very large attendance, many standing thruout the service. The preacher was the Lord Bishop of Niagara, who based his centenary address on Deuteronomy, xxxii., 7: "Remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations; ask thy father, and he will show thee, thy elders, and they will tell thee." Men, he said, cannot escape from the past. All have to do with the yesterday, to-day and forever. London had just celebrated the 1300th year of its foundation as a Christian church. What that

The preacher then briefly sketched the portion of Britain and the empire in 1804, at which date, he said, the church in Canada was very young. St. James' was not meeting with the same difficulties which had confronted trinity Church, New York. In 1803 Toronto had no place of worship, and at first service was held in the court house. In 1804 Dr. Okill Stuart, the first rector of the parish, built the first church,50 feet by 40 feet, with four windows above and below. He was succeeded by Dr. Strachan, and in 1818 it became necessary to enlarge the church, in which assembled all the elite of Upper Canada. In 1830, to keep pace with the times, came the second St. James', 100 feet by 75 feet, which was a great advance.
