Can Be Spread by Dogs or Carried on Boots.

Its Ravages in East Essex-1,500 Animals Already Slaughtered.

Ottawa. Nov. 3.-The hog cholera, which has existed in the county of Essex for some years, has lately increased to an alarming extent, and the After paying all expenses, the ladies Department of Agriculture is taking of the Park Street Methodist Church, energetic steps to stamp it out. Dr. McEachren, chief veterinary inspector for the Department, after spending some time in the affected townships of Malden, Anderson, Colchester South and Gosfield South, states that since January the disease has broken out on 50 different farms in these four townships. It is

VERY CONTAGIOUS. and can be carried, for instance, on the boots, or by dogs. It has been determined to appoint one or two men to see that the measures adopted by the Department are carried out. Each farm is to be put in quarantine and printed directions distributed, indicating the means of routing out the disease, the mode of cleaning and disinfecting the premises, and so forth.

THE SLAUGHTER. Hogs are being slaughtered on the infected farms, and an indemnity under the Contagious Diseases Animals Act paid, namely, one-third for those petition against live pigeon shooting, which are actually diseased, and three-fourths of the value of those in contact. About 1,500 hogs have already been slaughtered, and about \$1,000 a month is being paid out by the Department in indemnity. It has been thought advisable also to stop the movements of hogs, hog products and hog manure, within the limits of the above-named townships, to prevent the disease from being carried beyond

CO-OPERATION. Essex county is largely devoted to the growing of corn and feeding of hogs, and consequently the matter is that county, and the officers of the quarantine service are promised the active co-operation of the farmers and municipal offers. This co-operation is essential to the complete success of the plan of the Department. The cases of hog cholera which have occurred recently in the vicinity of Toronto come from Essex.


