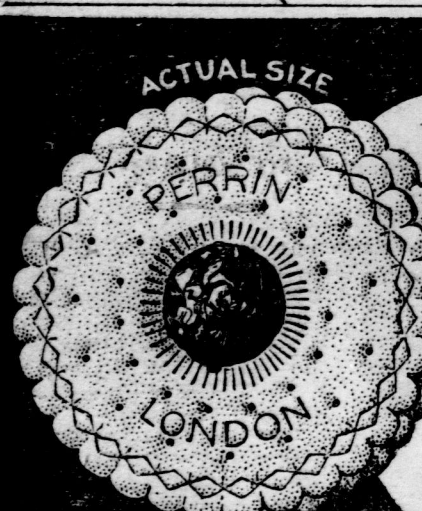

The Toronto Telegram has the following article from a special correspondent:

First the dog building had been gaily decorated with colored bunting, and for the first time in the history of the cat shows the whole of the lower floor was used. This was the largest and best show ever held in Canada, 212 cats being entered. By the way, every cat entered in the championship classes and winning a first prize, is entitled to count three points towards the ten required to make it a champion.

Cats in Good Condition.

Many remarks were passed by American visitors about the splendid variety and condition of the short hair cats owned in Canada.

In the few years the Royal Canadian Cat Club has existed, it has done very good work for the cat in general.

Siamese Cats Shown.

It is most encouraging to see the interest that the girls and boys are commencing to take in this much neglected and abused animal. Two Siamese cats were shown, one belonged to Miss Jane Cathart, of Oradell, New Jersey; and the other to Mrs. Dykehouse, of Grand Rapids, Michigan. Peterkin, a Russian blue, who was imported by Mrs. Sage, of Rochester (who, by the way, lectures before the school children of the United States on behalf of the Humane Society), carried off a number of ribbons.

Silver Short-Haired Cats.

Mrs. Mitchellson, of Tariffville, Connecticut, brought her imported silver short-hair, who rejoices in the name of "The Buzzing Silver." Mrs. Keilher getting her first defeat with her cat Silver Heels, but she did particularly well in taking a second, so is not at all discouraged.

Miss Annie Wood, of London, carried off her share of prizes and special. One of the most attractive cats was the one in which was a blue and cream queen, with her family of assorted colors, belonging to Miss Wood in the show.

Mr. Knott, of London, purchased a handsome orange queen, Princess Goldie, from Mrs. Dykehouse, as a mate to his splendid orange tabby, Alfonso.

Valuable Cat Lost.

Mr. Marshall, of Beamsville, entered Russett, a magnificent orange male, but unfortunately he got lost between the Union station and the exhibition, consequently Red Prince of Gladfield had the field to himself.

Dr. Niven Won Cup.

Dr. Niven, of London, who is a well-known dog fancier, sent down a number of cats and kittens, including Albert Edward, a magnificent blue male, who won several prizes, including the cup for the best male in the show.

Mrs. Bell is justly proud of her splendid brown tabby queen Madame Bovary, who got wins in the Connecticut and Buffalo challenge cups for the best queen in the show.

Mrs. Hardy, of Detroit, got a win in the Gentian cup with Rajah, her brown tabby male, who, by the way, will be with Mr. Marshall, of Beamsville, for a time. Miss Champion, of Staten Island, New York, was the judge, and considering the size of the show, there was very little grumbling over the awards.

Sunday in the Churches of London; Many Interesting Sermons Preached

Rev. W. J. Clark in His Old Pulpit—Rev. Mr. Malott at the Sunday School.

Large congregations turned out both morning and evening, Sunday, to hear the Rev. W. J. Clark preach at his old church, the First Presbyterian.

In the morning Mr. Clark chose for his text St. John xiv, 12th verse. Mr. Clark began his sermon by making mention of the Lord's last supper, when the traitor Judas was pointed out as his future betrayer. "Treachery is one of the chief causes of earthly troubles," said the preacher. Mr. Clark pointed out that there was but one being whom we could absolutely trust, and that was God. Somewhat one's best earthly friend betrayed him, but in God all could find a fountain of everlasting trust. Those who had found God had prepared for themselves a home forever, and God's children need have no fear of treachery.

In concluding, Mr. Clark expressed his regret at Dr. Pidgeon's decision to not come to London, and hoped that in the very near future a man equally as good might be obtained for the First Presbyterian pulpit.

In the evening Mr. Clark selected for his text I. Peter ii, 2, 3, and dwelt at length on the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death.

"Today we live and formulate great plans for the morrow. Tomorrow we are as dust and our earthly castles have crumbled away."

Mr. Clark quoted scripture to illustrate the points. One of the quotations was from Peter I, 24.

"For all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass. The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away; but the word of the Lord endureth forever."

The Rev. Dr. Ross' text for the morning sermon at St. Andrew's was "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

In part the speaker pointed out that the only true rest was to be found in God. He who is without God is aware of a great void in his life, and he who gave himself up to Christ found the blessed peacefulness which was denied the unrepentant sinner.

Yesterday was Sunday School day at the Colborne Street Methodist Church, the pastor, Rev. F. E. Malott, M. A., preaching especially to the scholars. There was a very large representation of children present and the services were most inspiring.

The sermon was a historical resume of the work of the Sabbath school. When it was first founded none knew, but as far back as the time of Nebuchadnezzar the school was in active operation. This school was continued during all the time of the Jewish dispensation, and during the early days of Christianity it occupied a most important place. The modern Sunday school was the result of the Wesleyan revival. The movement was much opposed at its inception by church dignitaries, but it won its way and now was recognized as one of the most, if not the most, important features of the church.

ture of church work. He regretted that there was not as deep an interest taken in it as there should be. The work was exceedingly important, and should be well looked after. There were five reasons why the school should be supported.

1.—The school was saving the Sabbath. It was making a proper use of the Lord's Day.

2.—It was saving the Bible. In these days the Bible was in danger of being a lost book among men, but the school gave habits of study to the children that would tend to keep the Bible an open book ever after.

3.—It saves the home.

4.—It saves the church. The Sabbath school is the nursery of the church.

5.—The Sabbath school saves the boys and girls.

Installation services were held at St. Paul's Cathedral yesterday morning, when Canon Daan was installed as precentor of the cathedral, and Rev. R. Hicks, rector of Simcoe, was installed as a canon in the cathedral. The impressive services were conducted by His Lordship Bishop Williams, assisted by Rev. Evans Davis, dean of the cathedral, and Major Hume Croft, chancellor of the diocese. After the ceremony the bishop preached a splendid sermon on "We Look Not on the Things That Are Seen." In the evening Canon Hicks preached an inspiring sermon on "Abide With Us for It Is Toward Evening." Large congregations were present at both services.

Rev. E. B. Lanceley preached on "Temptation" in the Dundas Center Church. He alluded to the fact that youth was not the critical time of life, but middle age. More men go astray in middle life than during their youth. Men were always tempted, but they should learn not to be overcome.

Rev. A. K. Birks, of Askin Street Methodist Church, spoke on the subject, "What Think Ye of Christ." His sermon attracted a large congregation.
