The Canadian postoffice takes the I view that the time has come for reconsideration of the whole question of postal relations with the United States. especially as regards second and thirdclass matter. This country has been carrying 10,000 tons of newspapers and periodicals from the United States to every 1,000 sent from this country. But our grievance is not so much in this disproportion of things as in the fact that under cover of second-class matter the United States is sending in all manner of publications that are not entitled to the privilege. Canada takes the natural view under the circumstances that this is an unfair arrangement. Until now American publishers have been free to send into Canada all classes of papers and magazines without let or hindrance until they came under the ban as immeral or scurrilous. The effect has been an unjust dis-

The new policy of the postoffice department is to insist that Canada will not, in future, give any better treatment to United States publishers than to those of her own country; in brief, that there must be a square deal all around. Canada will also demand the right to exclude any matter from the mails which her postoffice department sees fit.
