

CORK DEPARTMENTAL STORE IS
WRECKED BY BOMBS, MANY
SINN FEINERS WORKED THERE

Irish City Is Shaken by Explosion At Early Hour Today —

London, Sept. 28.—Cork was shaken by a great explosion an early hour this morning, one of the large drygoods stores in the city being completely demolished. The explosion was followed by the sound of rifle and machine-gun fire, says a Cork dispatch to the Evening News. Several persons were sleeping on the premises at the time the explosion took place, and the dispatch declares that military authorities in Cork allege bombs were placed inside of the large windows of the place. Three men have been slain, cold blood apparently, at Belfast as a sequel of the murder of a policeman and the wounding of two others. Dispatches received here indicate the assassinations of these three men were deliberately planned.

Serious rioting has occurred in Belfast, and it is said a number of wounded persons have been received in hospitals there. Large forces of troops, with armored cars, are on duty in that city.

RIFLE FIRE FOLLOWS EXPLOSION.
Cork Ireland, Sept. 27.—A violent explosion shook this city

about 2 o'clock this morning. It was followed by the rattle of rain and fire in various parts of the business district. When the townspeople ventured forth later in the morning, after the curfew had expired, they found the main thoroughfare, Patrick street, littered with glass and the front of a large departmental store, which is said to employ a large number of young Sinn Feiners, completely wrecked as if by bombs.

At military headquarters it was said that a preliminary report showed that there were no military patrols near the wrecked store at the time of the explosion, but that troops were hastened to the scene. They were fired on by snipers from the roof of the store.

It is understood that it is the theory of both military and police that a bomb placed in the show window from the inside caused the wrecking of the store. Intense excitement prevailed throughout the city.

Belfast, Sept. 27.—The shooting of snipers and others, which occurred in the centre of Belfast last night, caused a panic among the crowds which were promenading on Royal avenue, the main artery, after church hours. A disturbance followed the shooting on Saturday night and early Sunday morning, in which one policeman was killed and others were wounded, followed by the assassination of three civilians, and the arrest by parties of masked men.
