NEW YORK, May 22.—Matt Maloney, the Marathon runner, formerly of the Trinity A.C., has been matched against Pat White, the Irish professional, for a purse of \$2000 over the full Marathon course of 26 miles 385 yards. The race will take place in the Sixty-Ninth Regiment Armory track on the evening of March 5. Maloney is credited with the fastest amateur Marathon ever run in America. He won the race from Rye to New York in a little over 2 hours 36 minutes, beating his nearest opponent by nearly a mile. Maloney also won the amateur Marathon in Madison-square Garden.
