

COBALT--- Higher-Priced Cobalts Show a Stronger Undertone

Apathetic Speculation Dominates Mining Market

Cobalt Securities Dull With Narrow Price Changes—Crown Reserve and La Rose Firmer.

World Office, Friday Evening, Nov. 26. Considerable apathy prevailed at the local mining markets to-day. Trading was of a limited nature generally, and the exchange continued dull throughout the session. There is very little enthusiasm in speculative circles at the present time, the market meanwhile drifting along in a rut.

Much of the attention paid to the Cobalts was concentrated in Rochester during to-day's session. This stock has seemingly been the favorite for a while. An apparently firm tone was exhibited, but price changes were narrow, the shares moving between 18 and a fraction higher, and closing at 18 1/2. Trading in the other lower priced securities was in the main inclined to drag. Otisse remained firm with yesterday, maintaining between 23 1/2 and 25 cents. Beaver was firm, advancing nearly a point to 32 1/4, but easing off slightly at the close.

City of Cobalt lost a point, selling back to 44. Nancy Helen, Timiskaming, and such others as were dealt in were generally steady; Nova Scotia, however, developed some weakness, retreating to 44, a loss of three points from yesterday.

In the investment shares a good all round firmness was apparent. Crown Reserve, opening at \$4.66, gained six points during the day and closed strong at \$4.71. La Rose sold between \$4.23 and two points above that figure, closing firm at \$4.24. In New York the shares sold up to \$4 1/2, and it is understood were bid for after the close at \$4.32, with no stock offering.

The market throughout was dull, but with a firm undertone. The closing was at about the high figures for the day, while the whole list shows good resistance at present prices.

BETTER RESULTS FOUND ON WALDMAN AT DEPTH

Drifting on Vein at 75 Foot Level Will Be Started Very Shortly.

H. W. Hardinge, New York's eminent mining engineer, who is consulting engineer of the Waldman Mines, returned yesterday morning with Mr. J. H. Waldman from Cobalt, where they had been inspecting the Waldman mine and the other properties of the company. The Waldman mine is under the expert management of Charles O'Connor, than whom there is no ableer mine captain in Cobalt. The impression brought away by the visitors was that the further the Waldman mine was opened up the better it looked, and the better results obtained.

WALDMAN STARTS WORK

Will Begin Immediate Development of Claims 97 and 99.

At the recent sale of mining claims in the Gilles limit, J. H. Waldman of Montreal purchased claims 97 and 99. With the same enthusiasm and energy with which he developed the Waldman mine, Mr. Waldman has started work on these new claims. The work is in charge of engineer Sherron, who is an experienced mining engineer, and recognized as one of the most competent men in the district. The men will be put at work and continued at work so long as the weather permits, to prospect and trench. From every indication, including the formation, it is confidently believed these claims on development will be turned into mines. Contracts have already been let for the clearing of the standing timber. Waldman's way will have another chance to prove itself as it has already proved itself on the Waldman mine.

Fraser's Bargain.

A news item in The World on Wednesday referred to the purchase of claim 98 in the Gilles limit by W. A. Fraser and Shirley Ogilvie. For a claim No. 98, Mr. Fraser believed he has a bargain. He says that he was offered \$50,000 on his bargain on the very day of the sale. He believes claim No. 98 is worth \$250,000. Claim 97 and claim 99 adjoining claim 98, in fact, sandwiching it, are owned by J. H. Waldman of Montreal.

RAILWAYS' BRIGHT IDEA FOR BLOCKING VIADUCT

C.P.R. Has Long Term Agreement With G.T.R.—Heating System Wants Franchise.

Mayor Oliver has returned from Montreal feeling rather depressed as to the outlook for a reasonably early start on construction of the E-plane viaduct.

His worship and the board of control have a little conference with Mr. Thomas Shaughnessy of the C.P.R. and Vice-President E. H. Fitzgibbon of the Grand Trunk, at which Mr. Thomas pointed out that the C.P.R. had made an agreement some years ago with the Grand Trunk to use the present union station for 99 years. Whether this agreement will block the viaduct scheme for a time, the mayor was not sure. The C.P.R.'s chief objection to the viaduct was that it would cut off their yards south of the tracks.

The city's representatives found the railways, as expected, hostile to the plan of the Central Terminal, the companies feeling that if the charter with its wide powers were granted, there "would be little left for anybody else."

Mr. Fitzgibbon told the mayor the removal of the G.T.R. yards from East Toronto was final, and reiterated that the city's enforcement of the smoke prevention bylaw was to blame.

Another bylaw.

Another bylaw is to be added to the list of those to be submitted to the people, the object being to give a franchise to the District Steam Heating Company.

J. N. McKendry told the board of control yesterday that 80 per cent. of the city's heating system is in the hands of the city, and that the city is in a position to establish a service in Rosedale. Mr. McKendry explained that the city is in a position to use in Chicago, Detroit and other cities, heat being supplied to residences and all other buildings from a central station, thus doing away with furnaces and lessening the danger of fire.

As such a system requires the use of the city's streets, the board agreed to submit the bylaw.

C.N.R. Application.

The application of the Canadian Northern and C.P.R. for a lease of land on the east side of the Don below Winchester-street was referred to the assessment commissioner and park commissioner for a report. The mayor stated that if the railway were given the running rights it desires, the company's tracks, where they passed through Riverside Park, would have to be fenced.

The city engineer says that the C.N.R. plans provide for two level crossings at Winchester-street and Eastern-avenue, and the company should pay for the necessary protection.

The board of control yesterday instructed the city solicitor to engage J. H. Hollander, P.E.C., to represent the city in the suit brought by J. Ross Robertson to set aside the sale of Ashbridge's Marsh property to the National Iron Works, and H. L. Drayton, K.C., to go before the Railway Commission in the city's behalf regarding the proposed railway tracks west of Bathurst-street.

The mayor announced that a corporation would have to be appointed next week.

Street Car Changes.

A number of important changes in the street car routes are being made under consideration by the company, the object in view being to take cars off streets where they are simply pastured and place them where they can earn more money for less haulage.

The alteration which goes into effect to-morrow is to run Avenue-road cars across Bloor-street to Church-street, where they will be "Yed." The company claim that this change will cut Sunday traffic on Yonge-street to keep Yonge-street cars alone busy.

Another change under contemplation is to run Bloor-street cars from Lansdowne-avenue to Sherbourne-street, "Ying" at both ends, and to disperse with the belt line services, running the cars up and down Spadina-avenue and Sherbourne-street and "Ying" at Bloor and King-streets.

WAGES NOT UNFAIR

Men Employed on Riverdale High School Not Underpaid.

At the meeting of the property committee of the board of education yesterday, the effect that the carpenters working on Riverdale High School were receiving not less than 38c an hour, while another was paid 35c, was discussed. It is claimed that they were underpaid by the contractor, H. Lucas. This has also been investigated and was found to be untrue.

A committee was appointed to make an offer for the purchase of 173 to 177 Elizabeth-street, so as to be in position to enlarge the school grounds. The price mentioned is \$15,500, but this was considered expensive. A fair offer will be made, and that is refused the land will be expropriated.

A committee was chosen to report upon the conditions of the schools at the next meeting.

The committee will also look into the heating in a shed of Dovercourt school, where some teaching is done.

ANOTHER WITNESS GONE

Employee of the Guthrie's Has Left Barrie for Parts Unknown.

BARRIE, Nov. 26.—(Special.)—The Guthrie fire inquest resumed this morning, and the witness list was called. Miss Montgomery, who testified in the witness box at the previous session, testified a small boy, when she fell, and Dr. Lewis stated she was unable to appear for some time.

Police Chief King exhibited some charred rags and burned matches found in an upper room in the Guthrie house, which could not have ignited from the fire below. Fire Chief Smith corroborated.

Herbert Macdonald, an employee of the Guthrie's, has left town. Endeavors to trace his whereabouts have failed. He is still undiscovered, too.
