

Operation Decided On As Only Means of Relief

Regina, Jan. 27—The high price of wheth and the low price of Canadian farm lands will prove the attraction for farmers in the United States during the present year, according to statements made by J. Bruce Walker, commissioner for immigration for western Canada, in an interview here. Mr. Walker was of the opinion that emigration from the United States would be considerable.

That the large colonization companies are laying plans for a heavier emigration from the United States is evident from the fact that about thirty representatives of the largest companies in the United States and Canada waited on the Saskatchewan government here recently when matters affecting colonization in this province were discussed.

During February the annual convention of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers Asosciation will be held in Regina. The labor interests of Regina have decided to organize the Labor Representation League. For two years there has been an effort by the labor interests to secure representation on the city council, but without success. The labor men feel that their efforts will result in success if properly organized and directed.
