

TRADE BOARDS  
MEN ARE TOLD  
OF AGRICULTURE

Delegates at Fredericton  
Shown Experimental Work  
at Government Farm

FREDERICTON, July 23.—The bacon industry is one of the most profitable, if not the most profitable, branch of livestock handling, declared Dr. J. H. Grisdale, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa, addressing some 100 representatives of New Brunswick Boards of Trade at the Experimental Farm here this afternoon.

Dr. Grisdale emphasized the importance of improving the quality of Canada's agricultural products in order to maintain its position in the world market. At present, he said, Canada is on an equal footing with other countries exporting agricultural products, and must be prepared to meet the competition. He predicted that Canada would soon have the preference in the bacon market.

The field day proved a marked success and reflects credit on the organizers. The day was held in the Agricultural Station. Among the communities reported were Saint John, St. Stephen, Fredericton, Woodstock, Edmundston, Bathurst and Newcastle.

The morning was spent in inspection of the livestock of the farm. Luncheon was served at the noon hour in the Agricultural school and was followed by a number of addresses. After the field crops were inspected and the experimental work explained. A large number of ladies attended the gathering.

THE SPEAKERS.  
The speakers were: F. C. Elford, director of the World's Poultry Congress to be held in Ottawa in July of 1927, who spoke on that subject; J. H. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture in Canada, who spoke on the future outlook of agriculture in the Dominion, and Deputy Minister Roushbourgh of Ontario department of agriculture, who supplemented the remarks of Grisdale.

PLEDGE SUPPORT  
After the address by Mr. Elford, a resolution was passed on the motion of Col. A. E. Massey, of Saint John, seconded by Mayor W. G. Clark, of Fredericton, endorsing the holding of the world's poultry congress in Canada and pledging co-operation in the matter of entertainment of delegates who might visit New Brunswick.

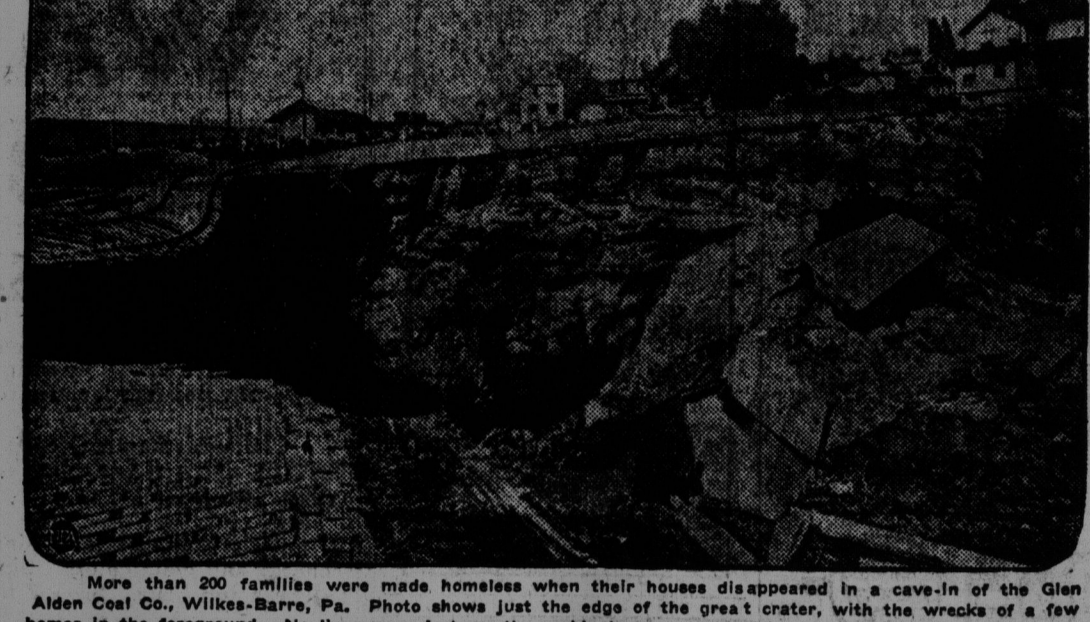
TO TRANSPORT PARTY  
Ex-Mayor W. S. Hooper, of Fredericton, offered to organize a Fredericton committee which would undertake the transportation of the visiting parties from Fredericton to Riviere du Loup if Saint John would agree to provide similar transportation from Cape Tormentine to Saint John.

MR. ELFORD  
Mr. Elford emphasized that the World's Poultry Congress would give New Brunswick a chance for placing her opportunities as a poultry raising country before the people represented who would be from 28 to 40 different countries. He urged that arrangements be made for the entertainment of overseas delegates and the New England party when they should visit New Brunswick.

Body Is Found at Sand Point,  
Pt. du Chene Mystery Cleared

SHERIDIAN, July 23.—The mystery regarding the fate of Daniel Gaudet, a young man employed in the Canadian National Railway locomotive department at Moncton, which has existed since last Sunday was dispelled late this afternoon, when three boys bathing at Sand Point, 4 Point du Chene, found his body near the shore. Gaudet with hundreds of others was at the Sand Point beach on Sunday afternoon. He borrowed a bathing suit from the pavilion, and when he did not return at night, the manager notified the chief of police at Moncton that clothing in a dressing room of the pavilion bore the name of Daniel Gaudet. About 5:30 o'clock this afternoon, Rose Dickie and Douglas Dickie, of Moncton, and Thomas McLennan, of Toronto, summer visitors, while wading in the water at low tide came across the body. Chief of Police Gunn and Dr. Eric Robidoux, coroner, of Sheridac were notified and the body was removed to the Richard undertaking rooms here. An inquest will be held today. Gaudet was 22 years of age and leaves a wife and three children.

In Church Parade

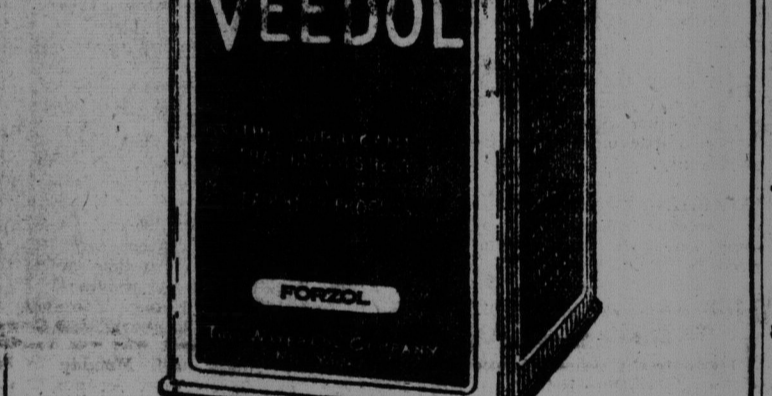

R. will join the Cape Town's crew at the wharf and headed by either the brass band of the warships or the pipers of the local company will march along St. James, Charlotte, King and Germain streets to the church. After service the parade will pass along Germain, King and Prince William to Reed's Point.
