WILL BUY 2 TRUCKS

Commissioner Wigmore Authorized to Make Purchase For Water Dept.

At the committee meeting of the Common Council this morning it was decided to recommend to the council that Commissioner Wigmore be authorized to procure two new trucks for the water department at a net cost of \$11,000 to be paid for from water revenue.
