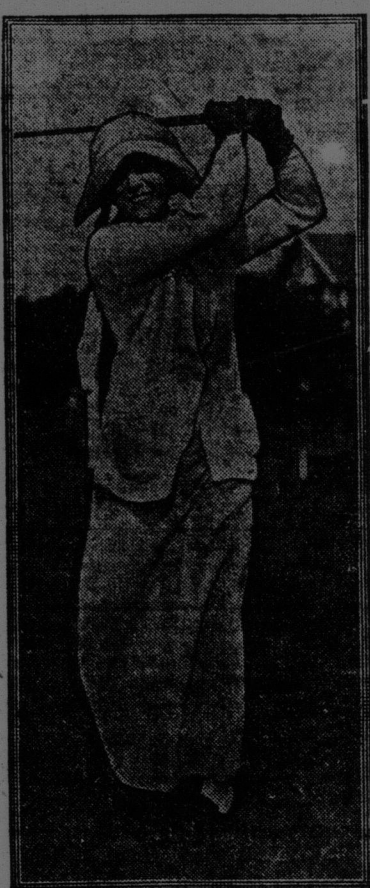

LONDON PAPER BUYS  
480 ACRES IN ALBERTA

Demonstration Farm As Model  
Place To Train Settlers

Reynold's Newspaper, of London, which is devoted to the emigration of people from crowded London to Western Canada, has purchased 480 acres of land near Castor, and will demonstrate the possibilities of farming in Alberta.

The deal for the land was consummated by Mrs. Hamar Jackson, a London writer, representing the newspaper, and the land department of the C. P. R.

Mrs. Jackson has taken over the property at Castor. She expects to go to Edmonton to consult with Hon. Duncan Marshall, minister of agriculture, and later, with the experts in the employ of the department of natural resources of the C. P. R. as to the best methods of development.

Mrs. Jackson is enthusiastic over her newspaper experiments.

"London, as you know, has a population of 7,000,000," she said, in an interview. "At least, 1,000,000 of these are not wanted, and are anxious indeed to better their conditions. But they do not know how to go about it, and it is the mission of my paper to put before them details of this country, where they can make a decent living, and are not under the necessity of living from hand to mouth."

"Everyone knows that the working classes of Great Britain are the most thrifty, less classes in the world. That is not their fault, but the fault of conditions which govern their lives from which it is difficult for them to escape. Living from day to day, as these people do, they have no money to pay their passage to Canada, and it would seem advisable for the government of Canada, which wants population badly, to do something in the way of assisting intending immigrants to Canada."

"Now the Australian government has very lately adopted the most energetic measures to induce immigration to the commonwealth. For \$10, it will carry its immigrants to Australia, while it costs two or three times that amount to bring immigrants to Canada, which is so much nearer."

"Lately the Australian government has bought ground and is erecting handsome buildings in the very business heart of London at the cost of several million dollars, how much I would be afraid to say."

"If Canada desires the immigrants it should make some arrangement whereby those who cannot afford the expensive trip would be assisted to come out here. An economist recently placed the value of a new immigrant to a country at \$200, and Canada, therefore, adds to her capital account with every new arrival the sum of \$100."

"In a recent article in Reynold's, the advantages of Canada were outlined and free passages offered to the paper's readers. In reply to that one article 2,000 letters were received, and 600 taken under consideration, showing in some little way the desire of old country people to emigrate to this country."

Mrs. Hamar Jackson showed some of the articles from her pen in various publications, all of which indicated careful thought in describing the conditions in different parts of Canada.

DAVID A. DALEY MEETS  
DEATH AT PETTINGILL WHARF

David A. Daley, foreman for H. S. Gregory & Sons, Alvedore, was killed on Saturday night at Pettingill's wharf. The steamer was preparing for sea and while Mr. Daley was superintending the removal of one of the heavy cargo stages to the wharf it swung around and crushed his head against the warehouse. Death was almost instantaneous. His brother Fred-

erick and his son Hollis were working with him and were among the first to reach him.

Mr. Daley, who was 34 years old, is survived by his parents, in Los Angeles, his wife and ten children.

The children are: Walter S., William R. and Sydney L., of Montreal; Allan A., of Kirkland (Wash.); Hollis C., David S., Kenneth E., Alice M., Margaret W. and Annie M., at home.
