

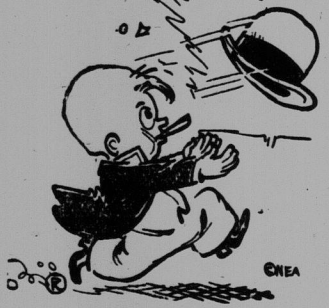

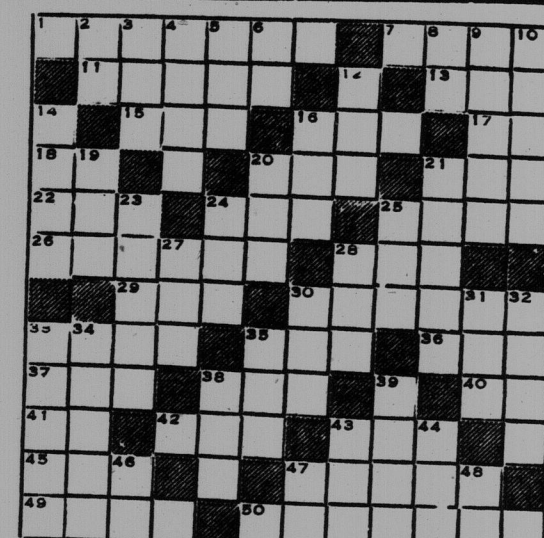
called sea-geese, for they really belong to the goose family, but their legs are so far back on their bodies they have a hard time walking. They live on the water most of the year.

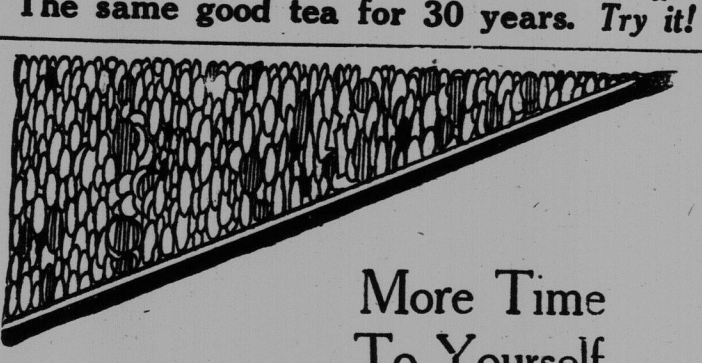

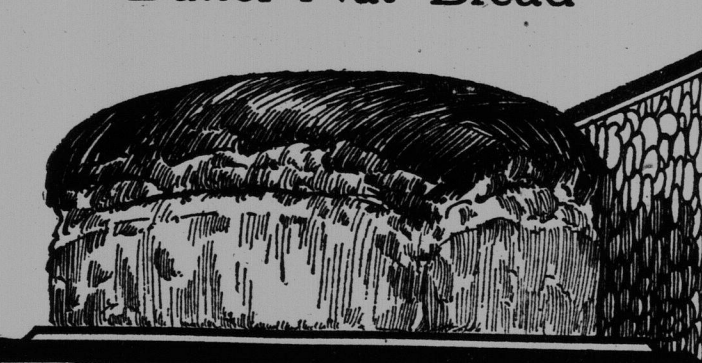
