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Mines and Mining.

Ashtcroft, Oct. 14.—On Tuesday last the B. C. Express Co's stage arrived at Ashtcroft with \$3,000 in gold from the Cariboo Hydraulic Mining Co's properties on the South Fork of the Quennebec. This is the result of the recent clean-up of the mine, which has produced a total of \$101,000, which speaks well for the able management of Mr. H. B. Bledsoe, who has been in charge of the mine since it was first started. There is to be yet another clean-up of this fall before shutting down for the winter.

Coal Hill Claims Bonded. During the past few days there has been considerable activity among mining men in this camp, reminding one of the scenes here about two years ago, when the Kamloops Sentinel. It is quite evident that the Coal Hill camp is attracting attention, and that there is a possibility of a big strike in the district.
