PARIS, Feb. 11.—In connection with the discussion in the chamber of deputies on the reorganization of the navy, M. Senac, deputy from Tarn and Garonne, introduced amendments to the finance bill, with the object of reviving the deep waterway canal project to connect the Atlantic with the Mediterranean. The plan calls for the construction of a canal 160 feet wide by 35 feet deep, capable of accommodating the largest merchant steamers and battleships.
