SUPREME COURT CHAMBERS.

In the Supreme Court chambers on Saturday, Mr. Justice McKeown in the matter of the petition of J. Frederick Baxter, of this city, machinist, for claim under the Workmen's Compensation for Injuries Act, and amended acts, vs. the Minas Basin Steamship Company, delivered Judgment in favor of the plaintiff, and awarded him \$650 damages for the loss of his index finger of the right hand, sustained while placing a propeller on the S. S. Brunswick, the defendant's steamer, April 5th last. The amount is to be paid in weekly payments of \$6.50. The case was heard on October 4th last and Mr. A. A. Wilson, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. W. H. Harrison for the defendant. The act provides that there shall be no appeal.
