THE ST. JOHN'S, ON SATURDAY, BROKE THEIR LOSING SPELL

They Defeated the Marathons in a Heavy Hitting Game by Score of 11 to 10--Calais Walloped St. Stephen to the Tune of 14 to 0.

Ford was put in the box and a pass ball allowed another run before the side was retired.

In the last inning the Marathons landed hard on Ford. Nelson got a single, Lynch a two bagger, and Winter, Nelson, Lynch, bases on balls, three runs were made in this inning, and although there was some excitement it was not enough to tie the score.
