It has been conjectured that he was an Englishman, but the license grant-ed to him in 1498, when he was a re-sident of Bristol, calls him "Kabotto, Venician." a phrase which clearly im-plied that he was not a natural born subject of the King of England. Cabot had resided in Bristol some years when, in 1496, he and bis three sons obtained from Henry VII., auth-orization to make a voyage of explora-tion. In the following year Cabot and his son, Sebastian, discovered Canada, but anthorities disagree as to wheth-er they landed on the shores of Nova Scotia, Newfoundland or Labrador. Monuments to Cabot have been erect-ed in Bristol and Halifax.
