

## ALBERT COUNTY POISONING CASE

Fredericton, June 8.—The Albert county poisoning case, which resulted in a sentence of ten years to Jethro J. Downing, has now reached the Court of Appeal. It is the Crown counsel that is dissatisfied and the matter is not about Downing's conviction, but the acquittal of Mrs. Johnson.

Mr. Mullin, K. C., who prosecuted in both cases, pleaded strenuously this morning before Chief Justice McLeod, Judge White and Judge Grimmer for crown case reserved. He had nine grounds to support him, all but two of which had been submitted when he made a similar motion to the trial judge, Judge Crockett, which was refused.

Salt Springs, June 7.—On Friday last the people of this community were shocked to hear that Miss Melissa Reid, daughter of Mr. Peter Reid, had passed away. Miss Reid had been in her usual good health until Monday of last week when she was taken ill with pneumonia. From the very first the doctor held out no great hopes of recovery. The disease gained headway until on Thursday evening she passed peacefully away at the early age of 32 years.

The deceased was known far and wide for her beautiful character and she will be much missed by all who had the pleasure of knowing her. Besides a sorrow-stricken father and mother, two sisters and a brother at home, Miss Reid leaves to mourn a large circle of relatives and friends who will henceforth wait in vain to see and to meet her below her kind and genial presence.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of land in the Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or at any of the Sub-Agency offices.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except in certain districts as provided in the regulations.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.50 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after pre-emption; extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. He must reside on the land in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
