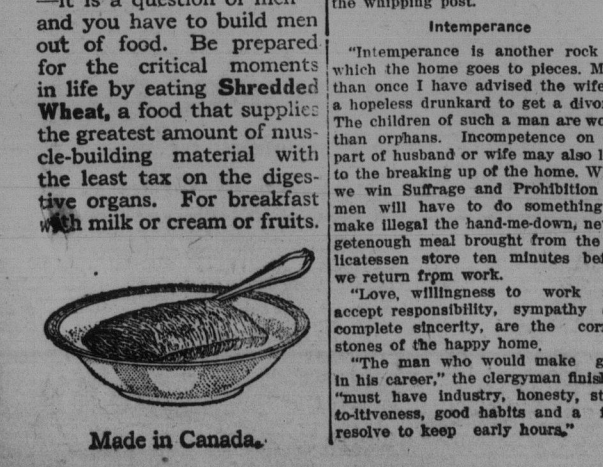
A New Decalogue In one of his sermons Rev. Mr. Rideout presented a new decalogue for wives and husbands to his congregation. Here are the commandments:

- 1—Thou shalt not be a spendthrift. Do not squander thy husband's hard-earned money. It is sacred to him and should be to you. 2—Thou shalt not talk shop when thy husband returns at night. Remember he has had shop all day. Study politics or baseball so as to interest him in something new. 3—Thou shalt not fail to have his meals on time. When the animal is fed you will have a gentleman to spend the evening with you. 4—Thou shalt not quiz thy wedded husband. Do not get talking before the marriage. Be adroit and he will tell you all. 5—Thou shalt not nag thy wedded husband. Hit him with an ax. It is more kind. 6—Thou shalt not fail to dress up for thy husband as thou didst before thy marriage. 7—Thou shalt not try to fight thy husband. The male has always been the better fighter of the two. Don't fight. Crying will fetch him sooner. 8—Thou shalt not expect thy husband to apologize—even when he is wrong. Let it pass. Kiss him and give him a hot steak for supper. Then forget it. 9—Thou shalt not hesitate to assure thy husband that he is the greatest living man, and that thou dost admire him far more than Hughes or Roosevelt. 10—Thou shalt never remind thy husband of the awful sacrifice thou didst make to marry him. If thou didst love him then there was no sacrifice.

DEATHS OF TWO HEROES ARE RECALLED "MYSTERY CRAFT" IN MAINE TO COME UNDER BRITISH FLAG?

Large New Four Masted Schooner, Percy R. Ryne, II, Attracts Hundreds, to Camden Harbor—Thought She May Be Property of Nova Scotians.

There is a craft of mystery at Camden, Me., which, it is said, will be transferred to Nova Scotia ownership. The vessel is the large four-masted schooner Percy R. Ryne II, which was launched on December 23rd, from the yards of the R. L. Bean Co. The Percy is riding at anchor in Camden harbor and has attracted much attention from hundreds of people drawn by the many mysteries attached to her.

Changes Ownership She is said to have changed ownership four times since she was on the stocks, but this is a rumor. She was launched without the usual christening ceremony, as no champagne or flowers were thrown over her bow for luck and not a stitch of bunting was used in way of decoration.

Funerals The funeral of Miss Isabella Colgan took place yesterday afternoon from the Mater Misericordiae Hospital, Sydney street. Dr. O'Reilly performed the service and interment was in the old Catholic cemetery.

Revival of Shipbuilding Another interesting feature of the Percy is the fact that she is the first schooner to be built in Camden for many years, and it has long been felt that shipbuilding in the town was a thing of the past.

1,000 WOMEN AND GIRLS MET FEARFUL DEATH

Arsenal in Dresden, Germany, Blows Up, According to Letter Received in Paris.

Paris, Jan. 27.—The Dresden, Germany, arsenal has been blown up and 1,000 women and young girls killed, according to a letter taken from a German soldier, dated Dec. 30. The letter was written from Dresden, and the writer said that all the windows within a radius of twelve miles were broken by the explosion. He added that the authorities were keeping the news secret, and that no railroad tickets were being issued for Dresden except for urgent reasons.

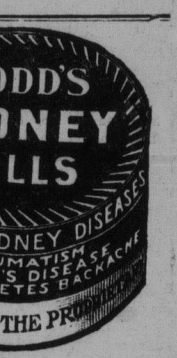
