
actually granted, in each case, in order to render the information under that head more complete. This has been done accordingly; and an extra column has been added to the Table, shewing the sum appropriated by each Act, with the chapter of the Statute.

Nothing further need be added, except to state, that the most ready plan of finding the entries under any particular subject, will be, to look at once in the General Alphabet for the title of the subject in question, without regard to the sub-heads, "*Addresses*," "*Committees*," &c. By so doing, all entries relating to that subject will either be seen at once, or a reference will be found to such of them as appear under the sub-heads: For instance, if the matter sought for relate to the Cobourg Harbour, under the head "*Cobourg Harbour*" will be found a reference to the main entries in "*Harbours*," and also, to all *Addresses*, *Committees*, *Messages*, *Petitions*, &c., relating to the subject, which may be contained in the sub-heads.
