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

THE SHAPE OF THINGS TO COME



Students membership was pointed to as being decisive in this struggle.

NUS sees housing as one of its main areas for work in the coming period. The SU representative received a round of applause from the audience when he finished his remarks stating: "Decent housing is a key part of a quality education...Education is a right, not a privilege - privileges can be taken away. This is one question we must win."

Alderman Leadbeater, describing himself as a socialist, argued that a crisis in housing has existed since the early days of capitalism when people move into huge cities towork on the factories.

"The housing situation is even more drastic now due to the general crisis of the whole international economic system



of capitalism."

While stating that only socialist system could in the long term alleviate this crisis, houtlined a number of pieceme reforms that he feels might help These closely resembled the ideas of Wright - rent control landbanks owned by city and leased to developers, and the city involvement in public hous ing.

Although Leadbeater post ed the question as being "wher A are our resources going to gar and who pays?"

Gordon Wright said that this NDP, while, of course, suppos ting a socialist economn system was a "practical party as evidenced by its three provin cial governments.

His short term solution to also consisted of calling on this federal government to launchife massive land assembly prograph that would supply cheap landsa municipalities and private developers - abolishinov speculative profits. Various forms of assisted mortgageal cooperative housing and rend controls were outlined the Wright.

Wright described how 4 was impossible for the preserad government of Alberta to carno out any fundamental changes its housing program, due to i direct links with the bi developers.

"What is needed," he sait "is to take the millions bein given away to the multination Syncrude and invest it on loan cost public housing."

In the discussion periodul various members of thise audience pointed out hay r piecemeal solutions such and rent review boards etc. have been tried in B.C. and Quebeev and failed miserably. One pere to son mentioned that it was pes question of control - that a long as private developers hay control over housing, the crisin the could not be alleviated by an patch-up reforms.

Leadbeater agreed to the concept of nationalization of the housing industry unde worker's control but somehow thought it more appropriate and some later date.

Wright also counterpose an immediate solution with th government getting into the housing industry and competing with the private sectors He defended his views by saying such measures were "bettern than nothing."

The forum tended to no pose any very realistic or exciting solutions to the crisis in housing.



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
