## Scotland is for slowpokes

If you are in the habit of taking holidays in England and feel that you have seen most of what there is to see in Britain, chances are you have spent a minimum amount of time in Scotland. One way to ensure you push north is to avoid flying into London and land instead at Manchester. From there, you can tour through the Lake District, the Yorkshire Dales and even see the cathedral towns of York and Durham before pressing on to Scotland.

You don't have to drive too far north of Gretna Green to be in a whole new world. Gone are the crowded roads and constant villages you have been used to further south, and all of a sudden you'll find yourself in a more sparsely inhabited countryside, a land of longer views and sparkling clean little towns.

It is certainly very tempting for the first-time visitor to Scotland to want to see all the well-known places right away. Restraint will pay off though as it would be silly to rush through charming little places like Castle Douglas, Gatehouse of Fleet and Newton Stewart.

The Murray Arms Hotel at Gatehouse of Fleet is an inn of warmth and character. Scotland's national poet, Robbie Burns wrote 'Scots Wae Hae' there, and this would be an ideal spot to stay giving you a chance to explore the southwest corner of Scotland and the Wigtown area.

Here you can see the famous Threave Gardens, 1,500 acres which include a wild fowl refuge, a lovely Victorian house and the ruins of Threave Castle.

Newton Stewart, a market town, is well worth a visit for a shopping spree. Be sure to visit the Glenn Cree Knitting Mills, where for reasonable prices you can purchase mohair blankets, sweaters, tartans and you will be able to tour the mill to see how mohair is processed.

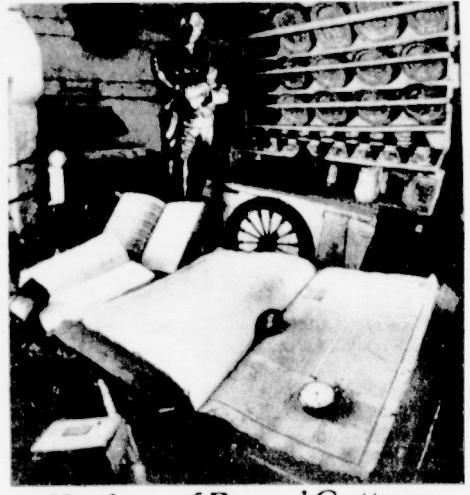
When you leave Gatehouse of Fleet you should take the magnificent northeast road through the Glen Trool Forest to New Galloway. This road is almost as wild and spectacular as some of the highland roads and from it you will see wild goats. Of course, if you are there in the fall the heather will be in bloom.

From New Galloway you'll want to turn back

to the coast in a northwest direction and head for the city of Ayr. Ayr is a very pleasant spot, has many excellent shops and a great number of comfortable hotels.

Alloway, the birthplace of Robert Burns, is only a 10-minute drive away from Ayr and the cottage where he was born is open to tourists. There is also a new Land O'Burns Centre there where you can learn all there is to know about Scotland's foremost poet. Opposite the Burns cottage is Auld Alloway Kirk, a ruin even in Burns' lifetime, and in the graveyard is the tombstone of the poet's father.

Nearby the kirk is the beautiful 700-year-old Brig O'Doon, a gracefully arched stone bridge over the river above which stands the Burns monument. There are two very pleasant hotels in Alloway and lovely sandy beaches.
