Too much praise cannot be accorded Allan Studholme, M.L.A., who not only introduced the bill, but has given us constant support and sympathy. His efforts in our behalf were eulogized in a pamphlet, compiled by Mrs. F. McD. Dennison, and it is matter of pride and gratification that Mr. Studholme was returned to the Legislature at the last general election by a record majority. It is evident that his suffrage activities have not lessened his popularity.

In 1911 Miss Sylvia Pankhurst was engaged by our Association to address a large meeting in Massey Hall. Besides making many converts to the cause this meeting netted the Association \$300.00—a welcome addition to our funds.

During the summer session of the National Council of Women at Port Arthur, the temperance women of that city organized a public meeting and, at their request, your President acted as Chairman and Mrs. Leathes gave an address on suffrage. At the meeting I offered my assistance in the formation of a suffrage Association in Port Arthur. It was accepted and a flourishing society started that has done good work ever since, and is a credit to our movement.

After the nomination of candidates for the Board of Control and City Council of 1912 letters were sent them, urging that married women who pay taxes should have the full municipal franchise. Many favorable replies were received, and Controller McCarthy later presented to the Legislative Committee of the
