tized them with the Holy Ghost which is the most exalted and glorious baptism a human being can receive.

Humbly hoping that all has been said in the christian spirit of brotherly love, we now close our remarks on infant baptism; and earnestly entreat that no one rest his soul's salvation upon water baptism, for baptism administered by an apostle would not be sufficient to save us. If we have not been baptized with the Holy Spirit, we, notwithstanding, our sacramental relations to God, are, like Simon Magus, "in the gall of bitterness, and in the bond of iniquity." May God in His mercy baptize us all with the Holy Ghost as he did the "little children" which were "brought unto Him."

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
