Max - Last year many parts of Canada were grievously tormented by the ravages of a worm, which destroyed the turnip crop. The animal was deposited on the under side of the leaf, and was little more than one-third of an inch in length, but grew rapidly. These worms, in the early stage of their existence, appeared to be gregarious in their habits, herding together and sometimes migrating together in a body from one leaf to another. This is the most suitable time to destroy them, which can be done by pinching off the leaf to which they adhere. In this way thousands may be destroyed in a few minutes. Those whose roots were infected by the worm last year, will admit the importance of either. cure or prevention this season, as serious loss accrues from its depredations.
