God had preserved them in extraoramary ways from their enemies, and how when He was come into the world to complete their redemption, they refused to believe in Him, and, blinded by pride, fell into infidelity. Then He concluded with these terrifying words, announcing their sentence for not having guarded the gift of faith: "The kingdom of God shall be taken from you and shall be given to a nation bringing forth the fruits

And the pages of history that relate the sad story of this once favored people are burdened with their terrible chastisement-their abandonment by God. The people of Israel, exiled from the land of their fathers and scattered over the face of the earth, mistrusted and hated and persecuted, without a temple, without an altar, without a priesthood, bear for now two thousand years the seal a reprobate people, and are a warning, a living, permanent, universal warning to all people of how God chastises them who guard not their

Fearful warning this, dear people, and may it serve to spur you on to be diligent in guarding your faith in yourselves and your children. The faith has had a glorious history in your own native land, that land that has ever been synonymous with Catholicity, and it is my most sincere wish and prayer that you may live here, in the country of your adoption, lives worthy of your traditions in your own native land, so that future generations may be able to speak of your ancestors in Italy-with sincere Catholic pride.

Father McRae's Death


