ANOTHER ONE OUSTED.

Douglas, Liberal, is Unseated.

HE HAD A LARGE MAJORITY, TOO, IN THE LATE CONTEST—END OF THE TRIAL.

Colborne, Nov. 4.—The Ontario election law provides that in a protest trial enough bribery must be proved to convince the judges that it affected the result of the contest. In East Northumberland Mr. Douglas, Liberal, defeated Dr. Willoughby, Conservative, by 431, so that to affect that result bribery must have been pretty rampant. The Liberals yesterday threw up the sponge and consented to Mr. Douglas being unseated.

When the court opened, Mr. Nisbet put W. M. Rutan, of Weller, in the witness box to discredit the evidence last evening by Robert Bertrand. Rutan, who is a court constable, stated that while he was sitting in the court he overheard C. Huycke, one of the lawyers for the respondent, say to Bertrand: "It won't do to lend them both; deny one and lend the other." This meant that Bertrand was to say that he had loaned \$2 to Reynolds, and was to deny entirely that he had given any money to Lebrun for his vote.

Mr. Huycke and Robert Bertrand were then placed in the box by the counsel for the respondent, and denied that any such conversation had taken place, or that anything had been said on which such an interpretation

could be placed. The treating charges were then taken up. Thomas J. Naylor and Richard Bonnycastle were examined to show that Mr. Douglas had been guilty of treating both before and after the issue of the writ for the election. Henry Chesterfield also testified that Mr. Douglas had treated him on Dec. 21.

Counsel for the respondent then called Mr. Douglas, the respondent, but before his evidence was begun the court rose for lunch. When the court resumed Mr. Douglas, the respondent, was put in the witness box and made a general denial of the charges that he had treated in hotels after the issue of the election writ. He had a memorandum of the meetings which he had held during the campaign and declared that the evidence given by Mr. Cochrane, the member for the constituency in the Dominion House, was incorrect. Mr. Cochrane swore that he had met Mr. Douglas in a hotel in Campbellford some time in February, after the issue of the writ, and that Mr. Douglas had treated those in the barroom. On that occasion, Mr. Cochrane, according to his testimony, had advised Mr. Douglas not to treat, because he would be found guilty if he did so. Mr. Douglas, however, had considered himself perfectly safe and had "set up" the drinks. According to Mr. Douglas' evidence this was contradictory. He had never met Mr. Cochrane under such circumstances, except once, and that was at Castleton, on Dec. 31st. Mr. Cochrane on that occasion had given him the advice he had testified to. He accounted for every evening during the campaign in which he had been accused of treating, to show that accusations of having done so after the issue of the writ were entirely wrong.

At this point Mr. Britton stated to the bench that as a few of the charges of bribery by agents had been proven, and as it was possible some others might be proven, he would consent, if the personal charges were withdrawn, that the election be voided. Mr. Nisbet agreed not to press the personal charges, and their Lordships, after considering the matter, agreed to this termination of the trial.

JUST A BIG BLUFF

But Russia and France can take it up if they want to.

Great Britain is flaking a Demonstration to show that she still Rules the Waves.

Kingston, Jamaica, November 4.—The British naval authorities at Port Royal, the naval headquarters here, express the opinion that the order for the mobilization of the British North American and West Indian squadron forms part of a great, comprehensive scheme for a naval demonstration on the Pacific and Atlantic, intended to indicate Great Britain's preparedness to face any and all possible hostile developments. Great Britain it is added, fully realizes the menace of the future, and would as soon accept war now with France or Russia or both, and the present determined demonstration means that the issue rests with these powers. It is believed that neither of them will accept this obvious challenge. But should they do so, Great Britain can never be more prepared than now, especially in view of the possible arrangement of an American understanding, and in view of the fact that the Marquis of Salisbury's government has the support of all the political parties in Great Britain.

MARCHANT AT CAIRO.

Cairo, Nov. 4.—Major Marchant arrived here last night. He was given a great reception by the French residents here. He declined to be interviewed. At the French agency it was formerly announced that no one would be permitted to interview the French officer, as M. Deleasse, the French Minister of Foreign Affairs, and the Marquis of Salisbury, must be the first to receive all news which may contribute to the harmony of the two countries. The major reports that he left all his companions in good health, and he adds that they had abundant provisions and a plentiful supply of ammunition. The French commander also expressed himself as being much gratified at the kindness shown him by the British officers during his journey to this place.

IT IS ALL SETTLED.

London, November 4.—An official note says: "There is now good reason to hope that the political situation is ameliorating. It can be confidently stated that when the cause of the irritation, which unfortunately recently existed in France and Great Britain and on the Upper Nile is removed, which is expected soon to be the case, the door will again be open for a resumption of those friendly negotiations, which happily characterize the normal state of the two countries."

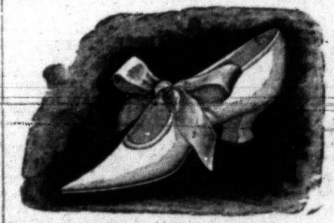
