THE PROBS

TORONTO, Nov. 5.—The distur-

ARE OFFICIALLY AT WAR NOW WITH TURKEY

(By Special Wire to the Courier)
LONDON, Nov. 5, 11:35 a.m.—It was officially announced in London to-day that a state of war existed between Great Britain and Turkey.

The proclamation to this effect,
which subsequently was gazetted, read as follows: "Owing to hostile acts committed by Turkish forces under German officers, a state of war exists between Great Britain and Turkey from to-day and all proclamations and order-in-council issued with reference to the state of war between Great Britain and Germany are hereby applied to the state of war between Great Britain and Turkey."

A privy council was held in
Buckingham Palace this morning to discuss this question. At its conclusion, King George signed the documents proclaiming the state of war and the announcement was made.

Feuson, each with a small gift in the shape of Safety Razors, as a remembrance to their departing Brothers who have volunteered for active service with the second contingent. Several of the officers spoke very highly of their departing brothers and wished them an early and safe return. To which a very suitable reply was made by Bro. Inner Guard Patte.

Brantford Lodge No. 1475 L.O.O.L.
sent with the first contingent, five members including Bro. Capt. A. Colquhoun, Bro. Dr. F. Williams and A. Roberts—this making a total of eight members in all doing active service. By resolution of the lodge, all members volunteering for active service will be kept in good standing till their return.

Although the Moose Lodge is the
youngest fraternal society in this city, having been organized last spring it has a membership of over two hundred, and very fine club quarters at No. 68 Colborne street.

RUSSIA HAS WON BACK FIRST LINE

German Army Forced to Take Up New Position on River.

Enemy Will Be Unable to Advance Again on Warsaw.

(By Special Wire to the Courier)
PETROGRA, via London, Nov. 5.—The new position of the German army front along the River Warthe, over 75 miles west of the city of Warsaw, which they reached at the time of the attempted attack on Warsaw, indicates the tremendous retreat of General Von Hindenberg's army in Poland during the past two weeks. This retreat is regarded as especially important, since such noted industrial centres as Lodz, Piotrkow, Radom and Kielce are recaptured by the Russians. The strategic point at Sandomir which is at the junction of the San and Vistula River, has also been retaken.

There is particular elation over
Russia's advance since there now seems little possibility of the Germans regaining the lost territory because of any improvement in the roads, the conditions of which was regarded as a large factor of the German failure. The improvement of the roads is more than counterbalanced by the enormous Russian reinforcements since received. While the population of that district a month ago were vacillating in their sympathies, all are now enthusiastically with the victor.

On the east Prussian frontier,
the Germans have met with no success in assuming the aggressive, and at some points the Russians have even crossed into German territory. In this region, however, the German retreat was not marked by serious losses.

Some of the military experts here
explain that the passing of the Germans from the offensive to the defensive is due to the reports circulating in their sympathies all are now enthusiastically with the victor.

While the retreat of the Austrians
operating in South Poland and the Balkans is not so marked as that of the Germans, the official reports here indicate that they have moved perceptibly backward. The suspended Austrians, which is much acclaimed by the Austrians, is explained by the Russians as due to the fear of exposing their army to the cholera epidemic prevalent there.

WILD RUMORS STARTLED CITY

Report About Welland Canal Had No Foundation in Fact.

Brantford was considerably per-
turbed this morning by a rumor which was widely circulated that some foreigners had made an attack upon the Welland canal and had endeavored to blow the locks to fragments. Time after time the Courier 'phone rang and the query anxiously asked "Is there any truth in the report about Welland Canal." In every instance the Courier was able to give a convincing denial of the rumor to the general satisfaction of the inquirer.

The rumor had gone round exten-
sively and also every man on the street had heard it and the impression was broadcast that villians had been abroad. One rumor even stated that a sentry on guard had been able to shoot three of the foreigners who were found tampering with the locks.

The origin of the rumor re-
mained a mystery, but it is ascertained that a wireless operator in London intercepted a message with regard to duty upon the Canal and mistaking the sense of the message, he thought an attack had been made upon the canal. He then sent out a message which was taken up in Brantford and resulted in such a widespread rumor which was absolutely without foundation.
